GRAPE MEN RECEIVE 1ST LARGE LOAN

Farm Board Advances Million Dollars Wednesday

The first million of the \$3,820,000 asked by the California Grape Control Board as a loan from the Federal Farm Board is expected to be turned over to the board Wednesday.

The officials of the board had expected action on the loan request at Tuesday's meeting of the board, but word was received that the board was in conference all day with President Hoover on the plans for relief of the drought victims in the Middle West, East and South.

The money is to be used for making first payments to the raisin growers on the 375,000 tons of raisins on the vines that are to be turned into by-products.

Appointment of a general manager of the control board will be taken up at the meeting of the executive committee next Saturday. Several names are now under consideration. Up to this time William A. Boeke, attorney for the board, has acted as manager and treasurer, but as the raisin season approaches Boeke has asked to be relieved of the managerial work.

C. C. Teague, California member of the Federal Farm Board, whose approval of the grape control plan led to the sanctioning of the loans to the control board, is expected to attend Saturday's meeting.

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 27.—Miss Katherine Yamasaki was re-elected president of the Junior Epworth league of the local M. E. church at the meeting held last Sunday. At the social to be given on Sunday evening, September 7, the newly elected officers will be feted and installed.

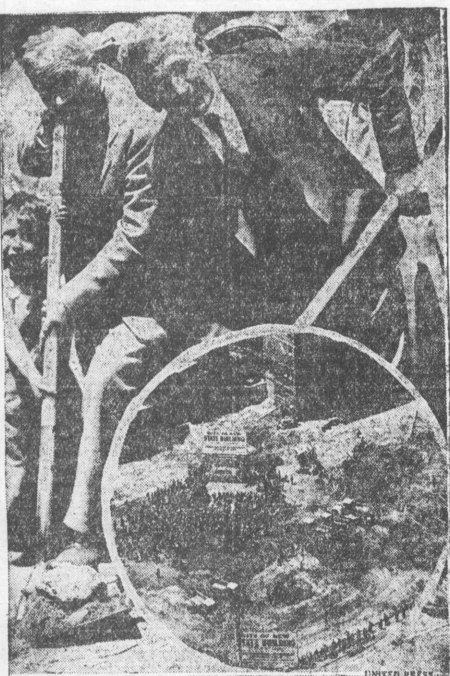

Bromley Delays Hop from Tokyo Due to Bad Weather Report

TOKYO, Aug. 27.—Harold L. Bromley's projected transpacific flight was again postponed today when the aviator received reports of adverse winds and rain on the northeastern coasts of Japan. The hop had been scheduled for tomorrow morning.

Weather experts claim that unless the flight is made during this month, the cross ocean hop will have to be abandoned for this year, as unfavorable weather will prevail from next month.

Catcher of Gardena Team Loses Leg as Auto Crash Result

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 27.—The right leg of a 19-year old catcher of the Yamato baseball team in Gardena, Sunao Yamachi, was amputated in an operation following an auto crash which occurred last Monday morning about 11 o'clock at Englewood. He is expected to live, according to Dr. Fukuda who performed the operation at the new Japanese hospital.

Yamachi was driving his automobile when he crashed with a truck driven by an American at Englewood last Monday, receiving serious injuries on his face. His unconscious body was rushed to the Hermosa beach hospital where he was given treatment. Later he was transferred to the Japanese hospital.

MAYOR ROLPH LEADING BY A COMFORTABLE MARGIN

San Francisco Gives Rolph Margin of His Lead

Latest reports as this paper goes to press indicates Rolph still far in the lead. From 8415 precincts out of 10,283 Rolph has a showing of 311,252, Young 274,790, and Fitts 240,252. James Rolph, Jr., mayor of San Francisco for the past 18 years, apparently will be mayor no more. At 11 a.m. Wednesday Rolph was leading with a score of 275,219 against Young's 22,728 and Fitts' 215,219, in 7496 precincts out of 10,283.

MANY TO BE HEARD Many precincts are yet to be heard from, many of them strongholds for young and Fitts. But supporters of Mayor Rolph assert that his lead so far insures his nomination. During the early hours of the night, Fitts was running far in the lead. But this was due to the fast count returned by Los Angeles precincts. Then, shortly after 11 p.m. San Francisco began throwing its thousands of ballots at the feet of Rolph. The mayor took the lead, from then on was never headed. San Francisco gave its mayor a 33,000 plurality over Young, with Fitts far in the rear.

SAN FRANCISCO VOTES

The complete vote cast in the city for the three candidates follows: Rolph, 73,695; Young 39,178; Fitts, 6718. Gov. Young's surprisingly poor showing in Los Angeles county and Fitts' dismal failure in San Francisco were outstanding features of the poll. Rolph's plurality in his home city was the margin of his lead over Young throughout the state.

CHILE PLANS SERICULTURE

New Industry Will Be Started With Aid of Japanese

TOKYO, Aug. 27.—The Chilean Minister to Tokyo, Senor Nieto, has received instructions from his government to investigate cocoon raising in Japan with the idea of introducing silk culture into Chile. The minister is now busied in making investigations in the Nagano prefecture.

According to the minister, Japanese capital, cocoon eggs and skilled labor will have to be imported to Chile in order to start the industry. Climatic conditions in Chile being the same as in Japan, the minister sees bright future in store for his country.

Japanese silk producers are giving the matter careful attention and help.

Interesting Courses Offered by Poly Night School

Differing in its plan of teaching but with similar courses offered as in Galileo Evening high school, which was introduced in these columns yesterday, Polytechnic Evening high school on Frederick street between Willard and 1st avenue is maintained by the Board of Education of this city with C. L. Markley principal, in charge of the evening classes. The outstanding feature of the system, is concentrated study in certain evenings for those who are unable to attend every evening. CLASSES FROM 7 TO 9 P.M. All of the classes except in advanced dictation are being held from 7 p.m. to 9 a.m. instead of dividing the two hours and fifteen minutes into three periods, as is the case with Galileo and Evening high school of Commerce. The dictation class is from 9 to 9:15 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays.
