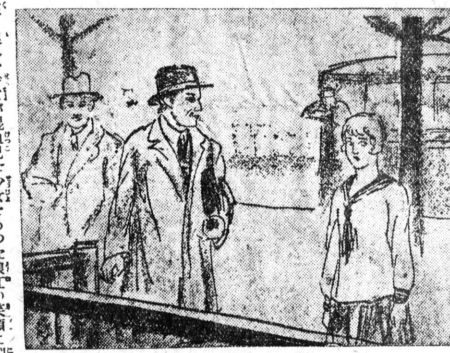

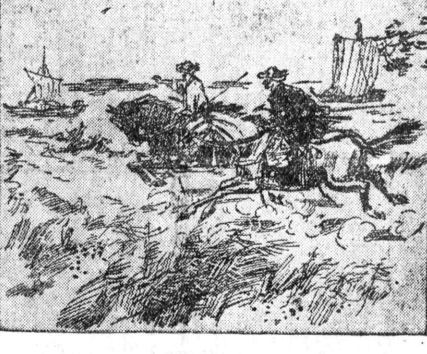

25 NATIONS GATHER IN NEW HOME

International House Has Interracial Homelife

Bromley has failed again in his fourth big attempt to fly across the Pacific—Talk about having a jinx! They say that all bad things come in threes but Bromley has gone one better and has had four jinxes all in a row, besides all the disheartening things that precede actual flight—And this time A. M. was sure that the poor man would succeed!—Someone said, "If I were Bromley, I would have kept on flying to success or death."—A. M. begs to disagree. Any fool aided by foot's luck can fly across the Pacific or jump off the earth, for all A. M. cares, but it takes mainly courage and grit to turn back admitting failure, and level headed good sense to see danger where danger exists.

(Special to The Japanese American News) BERKELEY, Sept. 15.—Nearly 400 students representing 25 different countries are now residing and taking part in the activities of International House, the \$1,800,000 structure built by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., to encourage friendly relations between foreign and American students on the University of California campus.

In making known these figures, Allen C. Blaisdell, director of the house, states that countries represented are as follows: Australia, Bolivia, Canada, China, Egypt, England, Germany, Hawaii, Hungary, India, Iraq, Italy, Japan, Latvia, Mexico, New Zealand, Palestine, Persia, Peru, Philippine Islands, Russia, Scotland, Turkey, West Africa and the United States. A few accommodations for men students of any race are still available, it is stated.

NO DISCRIMINATION Speaking of the scope and purpose of the house, Director Blaisdell states, "International house is a social and residential center for American students and students of other countries, without discrimination as to race, color, sex or religion. Its social life and facilities are available to students associate membership, and international understanding. Its program of activities will be directed toward elimination of prejudice and toward the creation of world peace through understanding.

"That the spirit of International house and its facilities may become familiar to as many as possible, regular Sunday evening suppers will be held. President R. G. Sproul will be the speaker at the first of these affairs this coming Sunday. Admission for non-residents may be had at the first two of these suppers, by securing tickets at the activities office."

FOR NON-RESIDENTS For those who are not residents of International house, it is possible to secure associate memberships, according to Blaisdell, for a nominal fee. This membership will allow the use of the social rooms of the building as well as admission to all Sunday evening suppers and other informal occasions in the house.

Three Filipino young men knocked a Japanese janitor late Saturday night unconscious on the pavement by the Central Emergency hospital by the Bush station, where he was treated by Dr. Scott for contusion of the skull and laceration of the cheeks.

The first intimation the plane was returning to Japan was given by the radio operator of the Dollar liner President Taft, which docked at Yokohama at 7 a.m. today (2 p.m. Sunday, P.S.T.).

Bromley was not injured but the plane was wrecked.
