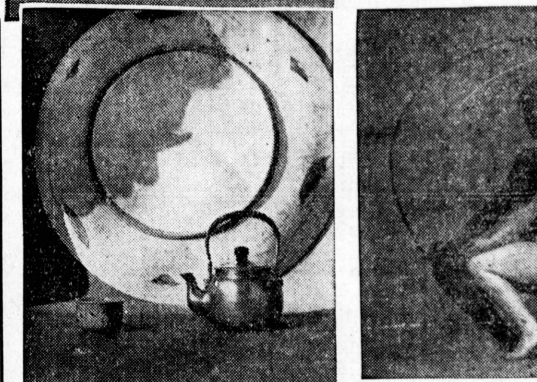
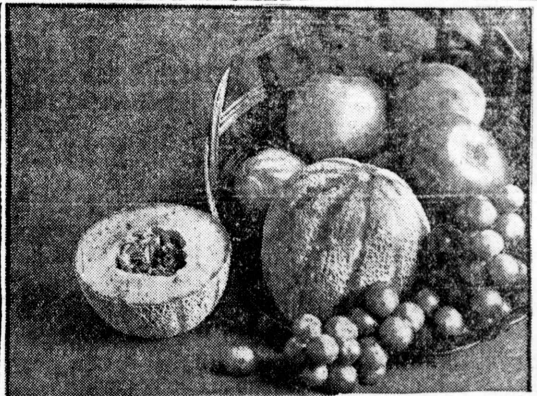

William Randolph Hearst is a hero after France refused him entrance into that country. Recently he made a triumphant return to this country and now he makes a speech over the radio which is broadcast all over the United States. An enthusiastic senator in New York says today that the "United States should make a protest" to France over the affront. Hearst papers are full of what Mr. Hearst did and said, and all favorable comments are printed all over the papers.—Which is all very wonderful—but A. M. isn't one bit impressed. If France had closed her doors on Hearst and he had returned simply and quietly and without grandiloquence—we might have been more impressed. Which reminds us of the time Lindbergh made his flight. We could never decide whether we admired his feat more, or his modesty. We now decide in favor of modesty.—We wonder if a great many Japanese who are refused entry into this country are heroes, too.

We see in big bold print letters that a certain Scottish earl who is visiting here "works for his living."—Well?—We wondered what there was about it that it should be such "big" news. Then we remembered the definition of "News" given in a local comic section a few days ago. It said, "When a dog bites a hot dog, it's not news. But when a hot dog bites a dog, it's big news."—So, according to popular conception, an earl is an animal who just "loafs," evidently. But in reality?—We wonder. Perhaps it may be that the titled people with high positions may not be as carefree as they seem from the outside, and we, ordinary mortals without a title or a penny to our name may be the most careful and lazy people in the world. Who knows?

Here is Dorothy Mackaye, an actress who has been in prison and who has struggled her way back to success again. The only comment she has to make on her fight for success is, "It has been marvelous. Everybody has been so good to me. It is amazing to see how much kindness there is in the world."—It is also amazing to see how charming and unprejudiced some people can be after bitter trials and experiences. Miss Mackaye is one of them. Trouble and difficulty make some people bitter and vindictive. Suffering and ordeals make others sweet, patient, and understanding.—Why, we wonder?

Here is an East Indian, Ganeshi Lal, with four body guards and a treasure chest containing \$5,000,000 worth of jewels and antiques.—At last! This sounds more like the India we used to read about in books and fairy tales. The more we grew up and the more we heard about the famines of India, and the passive revolt, and gazed on the lean, scrawny face of Gandhi, the more we wondered if the India of our dreams were just—well—dreams. But maybe the other side still exists.

RELIEF FOR UNEMPLOYED IS PLANNED

Gov't Awaits Returns of Census to Decide

Tokyo, Sept. 30.—When the results of the nationwide census to be taken in October are known, the central government of Japan will take an active step in relieving the jobs of the country if such is necessary. It is the opinion of government heads in the matter of the present unemployment problem of Japan.

PLANS BOND ISSUE

At the present time, the unemployment problems are being left to local governments to solve in their own way by local bond issues. However, if the census figures show that the situation is serious, the government plans to float a bond issue for immediate relief.

The Home department has been expending about ¥40,000,000 a year in building and repairing roads, and improving rivers and ports in order to give employment to the jobless. However about ¥10,000,000 have gone to the laborers, while the rest was spent for materials.

Business as well as political heads are in favor of a bond issue to help the jobless. General opinion considers that a bond issue of about ¥100,000,000 to ¥200,000,000 will be satisfactory. Stock exchange leaders and bank heads have expressed themselves in favor of such a bond.

PROLETARIANS WARN

The proletarian party and the Seiyukai party have both approved the idea with certain warnings. The proletarian party warns against the use of the money for the interests of capitalists. The Seiyukai party, on the other hand, suspects that the Minsei, the government party at the present time, is camouflaging in order to get out of a difficult position in the making of the new budget.

N.Y.K. Liner Ginyo Maru Arrives Here on 13,000 Mile Trip

Scientific discontent does not wait for catastrophe to stir it to critical study.

Scientific discontent undertakes to detect and do away with the obsolete in government before it becomes obvious to the uncritical many and before it begins to make for depression and disaster in the social and economic life of the nation.

Scientific discontent is the child of reason as social discontent is the offspring of rage.

Scientific discontent is preventive statesmanship.
Scientifically discontented men know that the time to stop a revolution is a hundred years before it starts.

Scientific discontent sets as its objective the keeping of the tools of government adjusted to the tasks of government.

Scientific discontent tries to cultivate in men the willingness to change the tools when the tasks change.

Scientific discontent immunizes a people against social discontent, not by inoculating men with subservience or smirking optimism, but by keeping the policies of the political order intelligently adapted to the problems of the social order.

The American tragedy is that men and women, whose scientific discontent means simply their determination to make government intelligently adaptable to changing conditions, are hounded and harassed by a political Bourbonism that lumps such men and women together with the hooligans of demagogic insurrection.

We must awaken to the fact that America is moving into an era in which governments insensitive to the needs of a changing social and economic order will not endure.
