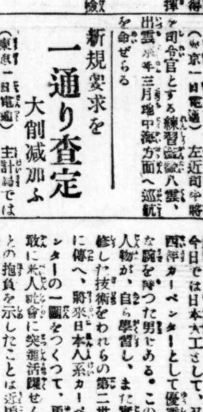
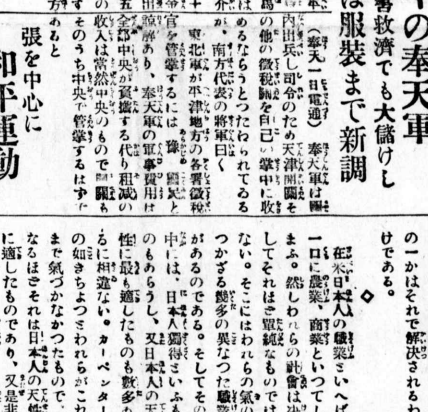
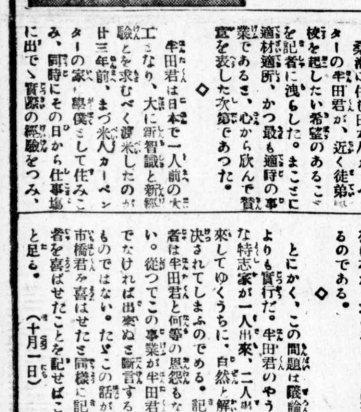

## COMMENTS

Dr. Christian Deetjen lost his arm today as a sacrifice in the interests of science. He is one of a long line of martyrs who have undergone operation after operation as a result of exposure to the dangerous X-rays with which they have been experimenting. A noteworthy seeking person sits up on a tree, or goes on a walkathon, or makes a bombastic speech, and the whole world buzzes. But no one notices the really worthwhile work being done in this world by really worthwhile people in their unostentatious way. No blare of trumpets, no blatant haranguing for them. They are too busy doing the things that are needed to be done.

We see that three Hollywood beauties were thrilled by the sights of New York—Many young people on reading that article in the papers will immediately dream of New York and sigh for its sights.—Why, we wonder? To A. M.'s prosaic eyes, New York is simply another city, a little bigger, a little more crowded and a little more noisy, all of which do not add to its attractiveness, as far as we are concerned. But tastes differ. Besides distance lends charm, they say, and youth always has an insatiable longing to see new sights and new faces.

Talking about tastes being different, reminds us. In Poland, they say, California prunes are considered a luxury.—We are glad that our humble and much looked down upon prune is being appreciated somewhere and by someone.

Reijiro Wakatsuki, Japan's former premier and chief delegate to the London naval limitations conference, in discussing the difficult position of the delegates at the conference, remarks that he had an especially difficult time because he is not a man of great ability.—Self depreciation, of course. It reminds us of the time we sat at luncheon with him when he was still premier. As A. M. gazed at this leader of Japan's destinies, and saw a tall, thin man, with a deeply lined brow, and a worried, weary look, we wondered. The official sitting next to us, noticing our fixed and thoughtful stare, hastened to explain. The premier, we were told, was especially worried today over matters to be brought up that afternoon at a session of the Imperial Diet.—A. M. made a mental note to the effect that we would not care to be a premier,—not that there would ever be any danger of any such thing happening, of course, but just as a matter of opinion.

When it rains, it pours.—No, we are not talking only about the rain. We are referring to the consequences. Look at the poor raisins and grapes. The grape growers have been put in a tight position for many years. On top of it they are having a hard time trying to make this grape board system work. Grape growers are still complaining of extremely low prices and huge losses. On top of all this comes a nice rain storm to spoil the grapes on the vines and the raisins on the trays. It is one thing after another.—Truly, when it rains it pours, especially "tough luck."

### Honolulu Has 5:39 Inches of Rain in 24 Hours' Downpour

HONOLULU, Sept. 30.—A total of 5.39 inches of rain fell in this city during a period of 24 hours last week end. This is said by officials of the local weather bureau to be the highest September rainfall record.

In the Waihupe and Waialae districts the rainfall was nearly two inches more, according to the federal rain gauge at the Hlnd-Clarke dairy. The record there is seven inches during a 24-hour period.

The heavy rainfall, coming as a culmination of the stuffy weather that has been prevailing during the last few weeks.

## HEAVY RAINFALL DAMAGES GRAPE, RICE, PRUNE CROPS

**Favorable Balance in Trade Reported in Export Import**

TOKYO, Oct. 1.—Japan's export and import for the last ten days of September are as follows: Exports totaled \$39,580,000. Total imports reached \$23,287,000.

The leading exports were: raw silk, \$11,829,000; cotton goods, \$6,800,000; silk goods, \$1,694,000.

Raw cotton was the chief import and totaled \$2,315,000. Trade experts are pleased with the favorable trade balance.

## SCIENTIFIC POLITICS

By GLENN FRANK

Science puts a disturbing challenge to American democracy as America enters a phase of its development calling for the utmost cooperation between the leaders of government and the leaders of the business and industrial system that science and the machine have produced.

The challenge of science to democracy may be stated somewhat as follows:

The life of modern America has been created by science. That is to say, the machine economy of America, the whole material set-up of American life, and the attitude of the average American towards his non-political interests, have been, in the main, created by science.

But the public affairs of America are, in the main, controlled by democracy.

It may be over-simplifying the matter a bit, but I think it is decently accurate to say that modern America has been created by the spirit of science and is being controlled by the spirit of democracy.

The future of America will depend upon the working relationship that can be established between these two spirits.

The American future will be bright if they cooperate.

The American future will be black if they conflict.

To date science and democracy have two gigantic forces that have tended to cancel each other and rob American life of the maximum possible contributions of both.

## WAKATSUKI HAPPY OVER TREATY O.K.

**Chief Japan Delegate to London Tells of Difficulties**

TOKYO, Oct. 1.—Interviewed on board a Tokyo bound train today, Reijiro Wakatsuki radiated happiness and pleasure over the fact that the treaty which he negotiated as chief delegate at the London conference is about to be passed by the plenary session of the Privy Council.

"According to the newspapers, the London treaty is almost sure of passage in the Privy Council meeting today," he said. "I am very happy. At the London conference the Japanese delegates worked extremely hard and worried greatly. Being a man of no ability, I suffered especially."

"At the conference it was easy to agree on principles since all the powers were not opposed to disarmament so far as the idea was concerned. But when it came to application, it was a different and difficult matter."

The former premier expressed the hope that the powers of the world will understand that Japan approved the inferior armament limitations because she has no militaristic ambitions. Although Japan's ratio is only 70 per cent of that of Great Britain and the United States, he expressed confidence in the belief that the national defense will not be put in a critical position thereby.

Mr. Wakatsuki who has been greatly worried over the passage of the treaty in the stormy scenes which have taken place in the Naval board, and in the investigation committee of the Privy Council, added that he has gained ten pounds in weight since he was assured of the passage of the treaty.

## BODY PLANS NEW RELIEF

**Tokyo Business Men Start Financial Stabilization**

TOKYO, Oct. 1.—Among the many plans and projects being started to meet business depression, the latest is a committee of prominent business men formed for the purpose of financial stabilization.

Prominent business men of Tokyo were called together yesterday afternoon by Momosuke Fukuzawa, a leading figure in Japan's electrical power industry. The new plan was introduced by him and was approved by the gathering.

## RAIN CAUSES LANDSLIDE

Los Angeles reported 2 of an inch with slight rain surrounding cities. It was the first rain of any proportion in the Southern city since spring.

Travel to the Yosemite valley was routed over the Coulterville road when the rain caused a landslide on the Big Oak Flat road. The all-plear highway from Merced was in perfect condition.

A cloudburst in Watsonville brought the total to 1.39 inches of rain in less than half an hour.

Other sections with rainfall were Sacramento, .01; Eureka, Mt. Wilson, Pomona, a trace; Santa Rosa, .02; San Jose, .02; Red Bluff, .01; Baldersfield, .01; Fresno, .06; Modesto, .07; Colusa, .14; and Chico, .20.

## Shoyu Kai of Stockton Is Engaged in Odd Task of Replacing Wornout Tombstones Over Japanese Graves

STOCKTON, Oct. 1.—Laboring every night and day the Shoyu kai is busy molding grave stones to replace the worn grave signs placed long ago. More than 150 of these signs are being replaced with a large cement stones so that the marking place of the dead will be remembered forever.

With the financial backing of the Japanese association, Japanese business association, Buddhist supporters, and the kenjin kai, the sum of \$400 was gathered to make these tombstones.

## CHINA PEACE IS NEARING

**Representatives of 4 Generals Meet to Stop Fighting**

PEIPING, Oct. 1.—A peace conference is now in progress headed by Chang Hsueh-liang, war lord of Manchuria, who is now in control of Peiping and Tientsin. Representatives of Yen Hsi-shan, Feng Yu-Hsiang, and the Nanjing government today conferred with the victorious marshal over peace plans. The representative of the "Christian general" is earnestly urging immediate cessation of fighting in order to take up peaceful negotiations as means for settlement.

## Asama Maru Is Due October 9 With Big Cargo of Silk, Gold

The N.Y.K. liner Asama Maru now on the high seas and due to arrive in San Francisco on Wednesday, October 9, has in her cargo gold and silk valued at more than \$5,000,000 according to advices received yesterday by Seitchi Nakase, manager of the local company offices.

Besides the shipment of treasure the liner has 485 passengers in all classes. The Japanese specie aboard the ship totals \$2,500,000 and the 3855 bales of silk are valued at \$3,000,000. The gold is consigned to the United States Mint in San Francisco and the silk is destined for New York markets.

Arriving in port Monday afternoon, the N.Y.K. liner Ginryo Maru discharged passengers and cargo, took on a cargo for South America, underwent fumigation and sailed at 6 o'clock Tuesday afternoon with a capacity cargo and more than 350 passengers in all classes.

## COUNCIL AT LAST OKAYS NAVAL PACT

**Privy Council Passes Treaty Without Conditions**

TOKYO, Oct. 1.—The privy council, in plenary session at the Imperial Palace in the presence of the Emperor, today unconditionally approved the London naval treaty and advised the Emperor to ratify the pact.

This removes the last obstacle in the way of Japan's ratification of the treaty.

Formal fixation of the Emperor's seal was expected tomorrow or Friday.

The session was opened this morning at 10 a.m. immediately upon the arrival of the Emperor. President of the Privy Council, Baron Yussu-buro Kuratomi, presided over the meeting. Two councillors, Kuki and Ishiwara, and the Minister of Communications, Matajiro Koizumi, were not able to attend due to illness.

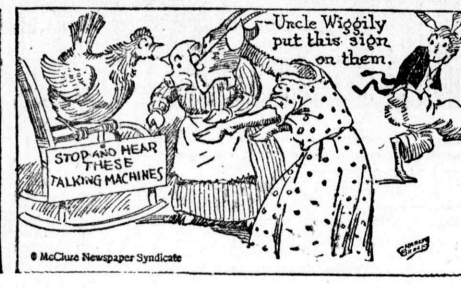
