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More than 150 delegates are expected to attend the Bay region Young Men's Buddhist associations conference to be held in Oakland this coming Sunday. It is announced by the registration committee chairman Miss Lessie Suyenaga.

WILL SING IN APPLE CITY

MISS LESSIE SUENAGA, president of the Y W B A and chairman of the registration committee, who will take prominent part in the Buddhist young people's conference to be held in Oakland, Sunday, Oct. 19.

George Furuta, well known Japanese baritone of Oakland, will sing two songs at the tea to be given by Consul General K. Wakasugi at his official residence on Laguna street this Thursday night from 8 o'clock.

The Japanese tour party, composed entirely of proprietors of various industrial firms in Japan, made a thorough study of scientific management of the factories in the United States during their stay of nearly two months.

After completing a tour of investigation of the important manufacturing plants in the United States, 10 members of the Japan Taylor society are now in this city. They are scheduled to return to Japan on the N. Y. K. liner Asama Maru this Saturday noon.

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Three second generation members, Kyoshi Togasaki, local businessman, Sumie Yamamoto of the Japanese Y. W. C. A., and Saburo Kido, attorney, will speak at the gathering on different phases of the problems of the American-born Japanese. A frank interchange of opinions is expected.

The party, when it arrived from Japan at Victoria, on Aug. 22 originally composed of 16 members, but some left for Europe and others are staying in the east to investigate conditions further.

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The Taylor society party is made up of such personalities as the owners of textile plants, milk distributors, shoyu sauce factories, shoe and "tabi" factories, chemical factories, and bridge construction officials.

ATTEMPT SUCCESSFUL

So successful was the first attempt of the Taylor society, that the organization is already planning to send other tour parties in the years to come, it is said.

The headquarters of the Taylor society is in the United States. The Japanese tour party was organized by the branch office in Japan. It was first established on the plans set forth by Dr. Taylor in his doctoral thesis on the economics of factory management. Branch offices are scattered all over different parts of the world at present.

1073 Hawaiian Born People Come to U.S. In Past Six Years

HONOLULU, Oct. 15.—In the last six years 1073 Hawaiian born Japanese young people have migrated to the continental United States. The number of Hawaiian born citizens who went to Japan is 3043. These figures were compiled by Dr. Adams, professor of sociology at the University of Hawaii.

LIFTS BANN ON JAPANESE

"Gent's" Agreement Made With Union Of S. Africa

Hanford High Girl Is Editor Of Prize Publication

CALIFORNIA, SOUTH AFRICA, Oct. 15.—As a result of recent negotiations between the government of the Union of South Africa and vice-consul Yamasaki, the Union has lifted its ban on Japanese. All Japanese may enter the country, take up residence, go into business, or travel in the interior, provided they have the visa of the Japanese consulate.

This is being hailed as another "Gentlemen's Agreement". Official documents of agreement were signed and exchanged between the Union of South Africa and Japan. Formerly Japanese were excluded in the Union states.

SANGER HIGH COED HONORED

FRESNO, Oct. 15.—With the approach of winter and bad weather, Lieut. Harold Bromley has announced that it will be impossible to fly to Tacoma until the return of spring.

Harold Gatty, Bromley's mechanic, is still ill from the effects of the influenza in the lead pipe during their last unsuccessful attempt to span the Pacific in a nonstop flight from Japan to Tacoma. He will return to the United States to recuperate. Another mechanic will be sent in his place if he does not recover by next March.

Bromley's plane, the City of Tacoma, will be left at the Tachikawa airfield during the winter.

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K. Hirota Appointed New Ambassador to Russia by Emperor

TOKYO, Oct. 15.—Koki Hirota, former ambassador to Holland, was formally appointed Japan's ambassador to Soviet Russia last evening.

Andy Masayoshi Yamashiro, proprietor of the Yamashiro Hotel, was third in the race for the House of Representatives on the Democratic ticket. He received 2321 votes. The first and second highest candidates received 3279 and 2639 votes.

A Chinese, Dai Yen Chang, running for re-election for the board of supervisors ran away from all other candidates together with two other candidates.

There is great excitement and jubilation among not only the second but among the first generation Japanese with the election of the first Japanese American, Noboru Miyake of Waimea, to a public office in this territory. Rooting is strong for Yamashiro and Oka, who are expected to capture seats in the House.

Dr. H. I. Kurisaki, candidate for supervisor of the city and county of Honolulu, lost out. Dr. Kanichi Takekawa, who ran for the board of supervisors of the Maui county also lost in the primaries.
