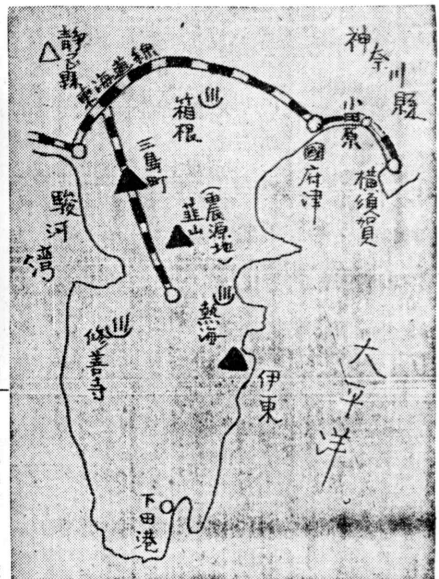

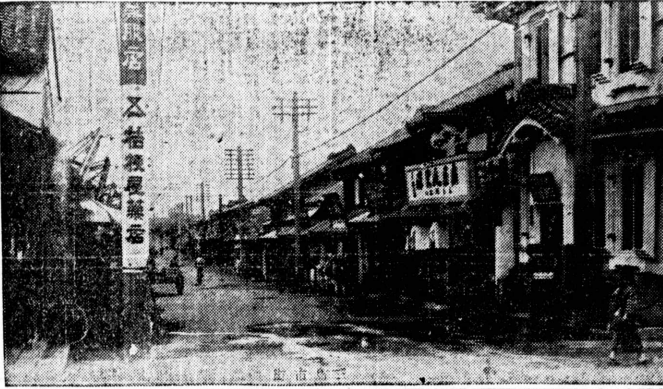

**THANKSGIVING DAY!**—In Japan New Year seems to be the day when people look back over the past round of months and give thanks. In America, however, we have a special day set aside for that purpose. To the Pilgrim fathers visible and tangible reasons for thanks were not lacking by way of shocks of corn, pumpkins, and the reassuring feeling of one's own scalp on one's own head instead of on the belt of some Indian warrior. —Today busy city dwellers, reminded by the sight of huge fat turkeys and the gleam of crimson cranberries in shop windows, must pause to consider what it is that we can be thankful for.—Inspite of the fact that there are breadlines in the larger cities of America, inspite of the fact that hard times are prevalent everywhere even in this land of plenty, inspite of the fact that European nations are eyeing each other ready to spring at each other's throats at any minute,—inspite of all that, the Japanese people in America, and especially the second generation, have much for which to be thankful. As yet no Japanese stands in a bread line. As we look over the thousands of Japanese families we see that they will all have a satisfying Thanksgiving dinner, they are all warmly clothed, and they all have jobs of some kind or another on which they can depend to feed their families.—And what more can one want?

**HOME** economics teacher at the State Teachers' college has estimated that \$3.80 will be enough to prepare a royal feast for the festivities of the day. This includes a big turkey, cranberries, and all the "fixin's" that go with it.—We agree with the hero of a certain moving picture in town who comes back to life in 1930 and finds that the people in that civilized day swallow pills containing all the nutrition of a big meal. He sighs, "Giff me da good ole days of 1930!" —Dietitians may rave about calories, and ladies may worry about diets, but what have they to do with Thanksgiving dinners? Nothing, we hope.

Justice is just and wrong is bad, they tell us. So, when a jobless man with a wife who is about to become a mother cashes a bad check for the small sum of \$30 because they are suffering from cold and starvation, they are both put in jail. Which is the correct and just procedure, we understand.—If the man is wrong and the law is right, then is everything alright?—We wonder.

## 222 KILLED IN SEVERE QUAKE AT IZU PENINSULA EARLY WEDNESDAY MORN

### Many Hundreds Injured, Property Heavily Damaged in Biggest Earthquake Since September 1923

**TOKYO, Nov. 26.**—Latest reports from the earthquake stricken area show that the number of dead in the vicinity is constantly increasing with the progress of investigation. Mountain towns in the picturesque Izu peninsula suffered 222 dead and many injured, with further casualty reports coming in steadily. Hundreds of houses and buildings were destroyed. In Shizuoka prefecture alone 187 were killed. Among the towns hardest hit were Nirayama, Nagasaki, Atami and Mishima.

The following casualties were listed in various towns: Nirayama, 37; Mishima, 7; Namada, 1; Nagasaki, 20; Atami, 5; other towns and villages, 120. Total, 196. An official statement counted 165 known dead, but the casualties at Nagasaki and Atami were not included.

**TOKYO, Nov. 26.**—Immediately following the disastrous earthquake yesterday morning in the Izu peninsula, the Railroad department issued an announcement to the effect that all contributions for the aid of the stricken area will be carried free of charge for a period of one month. Furthermore, all materials for reconstruction purposes will be delivered at half rate freight charges for the next two months.

**MEN BUSY FIXING** Investigations by the Metropolitan Police bureau in districts around Tokyo show that there were no casualties in this region. However, squads of men are busy today repairing broken telephone and electric wires, leaking gas pipes and broken sewage systems.

**Dr. Akitsune Imamura,** Japan's leading authority on seismology and professor at the Imperial university, is of the belief that this earthquake came as an aftermath of the huge 1923 quake and probably came from the same source.

**TOKYO, Nov. 26.**—Nearly 200 persons were known to have perished early today when an earthquake of more than 30 minutes' duration spread death and destruction across the northern part of the Izu peninsula, about 125 miles southeast of Tokyo.

Estimates placed the number of injured as high as 700, while property throughout the affected area was damaged heavily.

**MANY DEATHS** Late last night it was impossible to accurately fix the number of deaths. Probably the most authoritative estimate was that made by the Governor of Shizuoka prefecture, which includes the stricken peninsula. He announced 187 were known dead.

Previously the chief of police of Shizuoka prefecture estimated the quake dead at between 100 and 150, while authorities of Numazu reported 165 dead in their district alone.

**90 KILLED AT RESORT** A report to the Ministry of Railways that 90 persons were killed in a landslide at Shuzenjo Hot Springs was not confirmed. Authorities sought information concerning the famous Tanna tunnel between Atami and Numazu, nearing completion after ten years of labor. It was feared many workmen were inside the tunnel when the western end collapsed during the quake. The quake was felt over a wide area. Tokyo and Yokohama felt

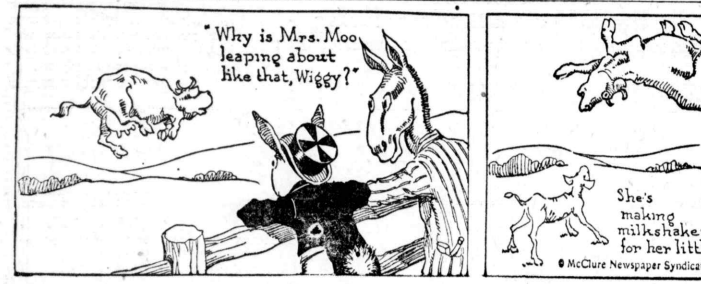

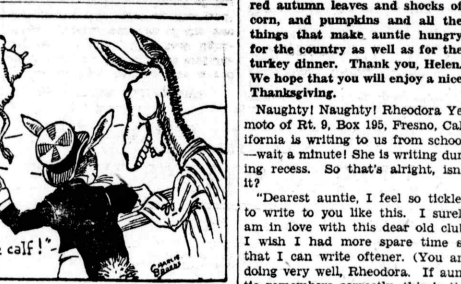
## ELECTIONS AND REVOLUTIONS
