PREMIER HAMAGUCHI TO RESIGN ENTIRE CABINET; AWAITS IMPERIAL ORDER

Home Minister Adachi Named Temporary Head of Minseito Party; Turmoil Is Expected to Be Seen

TOKYO, Dec. 9.—Premier Yukio Hamaguchi, who is at present in a hospital convalescing from the shooting incident of November 14, is rumored here to have made a resolution to resign the entire present cabinet members and is awaiting the Imperial orders to form a new cabinet by the new party heads to be named soon.

The Minseito party leaders and cabinet members conferred today and decided to elect Home Minister Adachi to be the temporary head. He will be formally installed to his new position at a meeting of the party members and ministers to be held at the Imperial hotel tomorrow.

However some turmoil is expected to be seen within the party protesting against naming Adachi as formal head, it is expected. The protest, it is asserted, will be made by the followers of veteran members of the party, such as Raimin Egi, Army Minister Ugaki, and the former premier Wakasugi and others who are said to be ambitious of becoming the formal party head of the party themselves.

NOTED JAPANESE ARTIST IS VISITOR IN THIS CITY

Shindo to Hold Exhibit at Legion of Honor Next Spring

One of the well known artists of Japan is visiting at present in this city in the person of Reimō S. Shindo, member of one of the two influential fine art societies in Tokyo, the Nippon Bijutsu-in. This Japanese, who is enroute to Europe, is planning to hold an exhibition of his work at the Legion of Honor Fine Arts gallery during the spring of next year.

So fine were the impressions of his work made upon Professor Perham Nash of the University of California that he is co-operating in every way with the Japanese artist to introduce his work to the American lovers of art here. He spoke on the Japanese painting at an art class of Miss Peterson of the University of California in Berkeley last Thursday.

Shindo is one of the selected jurors of the Nippon Bijutsu-in who judge the work of Japanese painters exhibited at the spring and fall salons. The art group stands on the level in rank with the Teikoku Bijutsu-in a governmental art group.

The Nippon Bijutsu-in is composed of famed contemporary painters and sculptors in Tokyo and Kyoto numbering 59 persons. It aims to preserve and improve upon the traditional Japanese works of art.

Shindo is at present staying at the International House in Berkeley. A score of Japanese admirers of his work in the bay region are backing the Japanese artist.

FLIGHT FROM NIPPON TO PACIFIC COAST FEASIBLE

Tacoma Flyer Tells Correspondent of United Press

United Press Staff Correspondent SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 9.—Despite his narrow escape from death in a recent attempt to fly from Japan to Tacoma, Harold Gatty still believes such a transpacific flight is feasible.

"I firmly believe that a flight from Japan to the Pacific coast is possible, and if another such flight can be financed I would be glad of the chance to have another try at it," Gatty said upon his recent arrival here.

Gatty's return to the United States was delayed by illness which kept him confined to his bed, as an aftermath of his perilous flight. Harold Bromley, pilot of the plane which Gatty navigated, preceded him back to the States by several weeks.

The strain of that last attempt to dare the headwinds and fogs that shrouded the north Pacific showed itself still in the lines of Gatty's forehead, and the sunken cheeks revealed some of the terror and duress of the hours spent circling above the fog, waiting for a rift so a landing could be made, while the poisonous fumes from a broken exhaust pipe made the air in the tiny cabin almost unbreathable.

The saga of Bromley's and Gatty's dramatic hop, which brought them to within 100 miles of the Kamchatka peninsula in Siberia before engine trouble forced their return, beggars belief.

For several hours after their take-off on September 14, from the sandy beach at Samushiro, in Aomori prefecture, the two flyers in their bright orange Emaco monoplane maintained communication by radio with various Japanese stations.

Suddenly, at 5:15 p.m., their radio was silenced, and for hours it was feared they had plunged into the icy Pacific. Anxiety was increased all the while as the intrepid pilots already were down were alerted when the Dollar liner President Madison, the same ship on which Gatty arrived here, reported receiving a message from Bromley and Gatty, asking immediate aid. The ship's radio lost contact before it could learn the plane's position.

Five thousand feet above the stormy Pacific, Bromley wrestled with the controls of the plane, unwieldy with its load of 1000 gallons of gasoline, while Gatty checked his charts and instruments, and gazed futilely high the mist-shrouded, cloudy skies, which made "blind flying" by instrument only a necessity.

Lost, and with a leaking exhaust pipe throwing carbon monoxide fumes into the cabin, both men realized that to push further into the murky night would be suicide.

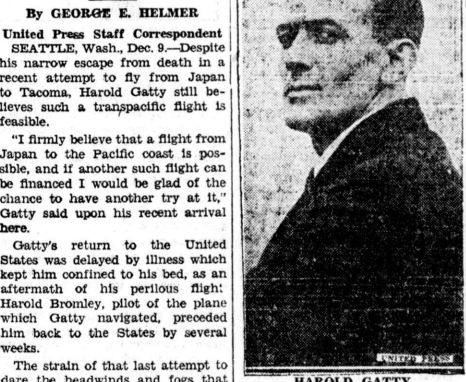
Bromley banked the plane about and Gatty, his throat raw and inflamed from the exhaust fumes, pored over his charts and prayed fervently that his calculations would bring them back to Japan and safety.

Hours after hour they sped through the fog, bucking headwinds, with Bromley fighting the controls constantly. More than once they thought they were doomed, as an errant current seized the ship and hurled it downward through the night.

At last they roared out of the gloom and landed gracefully on the sand beach at Cape Shirasi, close to the field from which they had taken off hours before.

Both men were utterly exhausted from the strain of the flight, as well as seriously ill from inhaling poisonous gases. Yet even then they both expressed confidence that the flight could be made.

Gatty is now on his way to his home in Los Angeles, but he will not remain there long. Soon he again will be seeking uncharted air lanes, for such is the way of the trail-blazer.

4 FILIPINOS ARE BOMBED

1 Killed in Explosion Occurred in Imperial Valley

IMPERIAL, Dec. 9.—One of the four Filipino lettuce workers injured here last night when a bomb was thrown into a stable which served 60 of them as a dormitory, died early today. He was identified as Ariston Lantaky, 20.

The explosion occurred shortly after 8 p.m. Monday. It wrecked the lower part of the old stable and broke windows in down town Imperial.

Deputy Sheriff Harold Gillett, one of the first investigators to arrive on the scene, said apparently some one had thrown the bomb through a window. Splinters of steel were found lodged in the roof and the floor was demolished. Most of the Filipinos slept in the loft, only the four injured directly over the spot where the bomb exploded.

The Filipinos were unable to give any reason for the bombing. They said there was no trouble among those living in the stable and no one had threatened them.

253 Houses Collapse in Formosa Quake Reports Say

TOKYO, Dec. 9.—Four persons were killed and 253 houses were collapsed in the earthquake that shook the southwestern part of Formosa Monday afternoon about 3:50 o'clock news report from that region said.

The earthquake was felt throughout western Formosa, south of Tachu, although its destructiveness apparently was confined to the area just south of Kagl. A report to Tokyo Central Observatory said the seismic center apparently was in the Pescadores channel.

90,000,000 NEW FIGURES

Japan Census Reveals Increase of 17.39 Per Cent

TOKYO, Dec. 9.—The population of the Japanese empire has passed the 90,000,000 mark.

The Statistics bureau today announced the results of the October 1 census, giving the empire a population of 90,404,103. This is an increase of 13,398,593 in the last decade, or 17.39952 per cent.

Japan proper was credited with a population of 84,447,724, a gain of 4,017,000; Korea, 21,057,860, an increase of 3,773,752; Formosa, 4,603,223, increase 948,825; Saghalien, 295,187, increase 189,422.

Seoul, Korea, with a population of 394,242, was shown to be the largest city in the empire outside of Japan proper. The male population of Korea is reported to be 10,763,130. There are exactly 3,987,742 families in Korea, governor-general of Korea reported.

MISS NOBUO NAMED FLORIN SHOJO HEAD

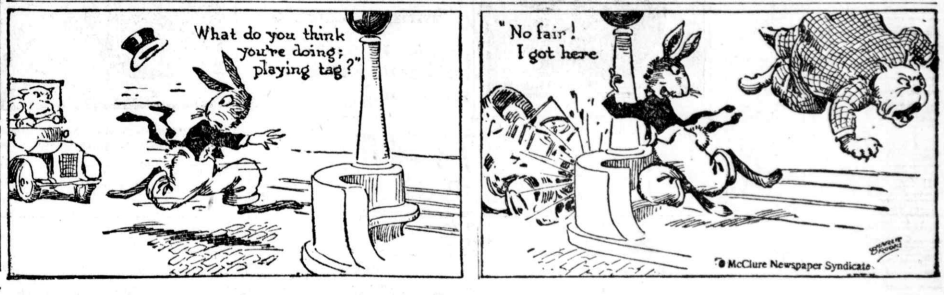
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
