## INHERITANCE LAWS TO BE MODERNIZED

### New Japan Code Will Favor Younger Children

[Special to Japanese American News] TOKYO, Dec. 25.—The Japanese Cabinet decided today to order a thorough revision of the Civil Code. The most important changes will probably be made in the laws concerning marriage and inheritance. The Japanese law of primogeniture by which the entire estate passes to the oldest son on the death of the father is slated for discard. Modern Japanese have long felt that the old law which was based on feudal traditions no longer suited present day social conditions. Under the proposed revision, the oldest son will receive only enough of the estate to maintain his dignity as the family head, the rest of the estate to be divided among all the other children.

Marriage will also become easier under the new law. A simplified registration process will take the place of the present complicated one in which the consent of the family heads must be recorded by the authorities.

All legal distinctions between natural and adopted children will be struck out of the new code.

The present Civil Code was adopted in 1896, and is based on the first Civil Code drawn up in the early days of Japan's contact with the outside world. The original code, promulgated in 1800, was drawn up under the advice of M. Boissinade, the world-famous French jurist, and is based on the Code Napoleon as are the codes of most of the continental European countries.

## AGED JAPANESE TO RUN IN INTERNATIONAL MEET

### Japanese Scenery Paintings to Lure Tourists to Japan

[Special to Japanese American News] LOS ANGELES, Dec. 25.—Kosei Suzuki, Japan's father of marathon running, will compete in an international race to be staged here early in February, it was announced today.

The marathon race in which Suzuki will vie for world championship will be contested by aged runners from over ten nations, according to the Los Angeles Times.

The race is open to anyone over 50, and to all second generation athletes regardless of age. Among the well known veterans who will compete is Eugene Estoppy, winner of the Fox trophy in the Bunton derby across the continent, and former world champion at 1000 miles.

Joseph Stettin, famous English ace will also compete in this event.

Suzuki, it is remembered, won the challenge race over Captain Gene Estoppy when he made his last trip to this country, and the fans are anxious to see another dual meet between these two runners, it is being reported here.

The Japanese who is the former 800 meter champion of Japan is especially good in the full course marathon of 26 miles and 385 yards, and represented Japan in this event in the last Olympic games.

## OPPOSITION HURRIES TO HIT CABINET

### Legality of Shidehara Appointment Under Question

TOKYO, Dec. 25.—In spite of the fact that the Imperial Diet is not meeting today, this being the anniversary of the death of the late Emperor, Seiyukai leaders were rushing around in the hope of scoring a point against the Mutsu cabinet before the Diet adjourns for the New Year recess. Acting Prime Minister Shidehara has been singled out as the object of attack by the Opposition. They will try to break through the government agenda and introduce an urgency motion tomorrow to take up the question of the constitutionality of the appointment of the present acting prime minister.

The Seiyukai has been contending that the Mutsu cabinet should have selected a regular premier to replace Hamaguchi in view of the fact that it was known beforehand that he could not participate in the present session of the Diet because of an injury. The appointment of an acting prime minister except in the case of a very temporary emergency is contrary to all constitutional principles, Seiyukai leaders claim.

Members of the Kenku-kai party of the House of Peers, led by Viscounts Tokieda Maeda, Takamasa Hachijo, and Chikan Ogasawara are preparing to introduce a resolution attacking the economic policy of the cabinet. They will demand that the government adopt some emergency measure to overcome the present depression. Although such a resolution has but small chance of passing, its introduction may precipitate a cabinet crisis.

## UNITY AND DEPRESSION

### By GLENN FRANK

Some days ago I called attention to the fact that the current economic depression is, in its basic character, different from any phase of depression that has preceded it, in that it is world-wide in scope, financial, industrial, and agricultural in character, and marked by a sluggish surplus alike of manufactured goods and of raw materials.

There is nothing insuperable in the situation, but it calls for national and international statesmanship, alike in the fields of politics and of economics, that has both the capacity and the courage to face fresh problems with fresh minds.

The United States is relatively in a happy situation. Probably one-half, if not more, of the American people have as much money to spend now as they ever did. But it has become actually fashionable to look away buying power which, if liberated intelligently, would go far towards restoring American business to normal health. The release of this unnecessarily locked up buying power will do more than make rush days in the retail stores. Its beneficence will irrigate the whole business and industrial situation. For the stores must restock; the factories must widen their operation; and multiplied thousands of unem-

employed must be set to work again.—when frozen buying power thaws.

But this alone will not prevent the United States from feeling the insistent impact of the world situation. And the sooner we begin to think in world terms the better.

In 1927, H. G. Wells lectured at the Sorbonne in Paris. The practical man who read his lecture then shrugged his shoulders at the impractical Wells. But what he said then begins to look practical to the practical man now—if and when the practical man undergoes the intolerable fatigue of thought.

"The master problem before us all, before our race," said Mr. Wells, "is how to achieve world economic unity, how to produce a system of world controls with as little blind experiment as possible. . . . How to establish enough political unity in the world to ensure peace; how to establish enough political unity to save industry and trade from becoming the mere prelinimaries to a gamble with the exchange; how to establish enough political unity to control and direct the distribution of goods about the earth—that, in brief, is the present task before the human intelligence. And we have no governments, we have nothing in the world able to deal

with this trinity of problems, this three-headed Sphinx which has waylaid and now confronts mankind."

We haven't. Mr. Wells is right. But we have intelligence, and we must concentrate our intelligence to a clear-eyed facing of the world-problem. It can be solved.
