

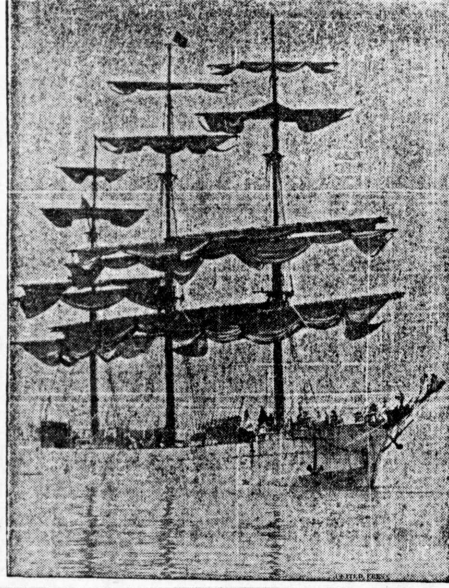

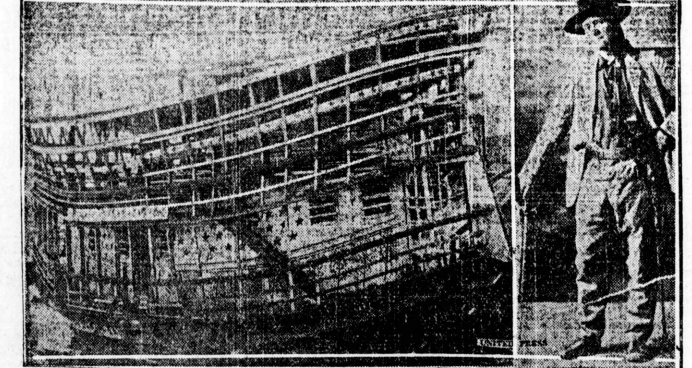
300 ATTEND XMAS FETE

59TH DIET OPENS WITH MUCH POMP AND CEREMONY

Brilliant Uniforms, Court Etiquette Seen in Diet

[Special to Japanese American News] TOKYO, Dec. 26.—Gorgeous uniforms of high officials of the land made their appearance this morning at the formal opening of the Imperial Diet. In the galaxy of gold braids and glittering decorations it was a noticeable fact that all the pomp and splendor except one was paraded by Minseto members. Tsuyoshi Inukai, president of the Seiyukai party was the lone member of that party to appear in formal, official regalia.

APPEAR IN SACK COATS

Proletarian members, having no glittering uniforms like their fellow bourgeois members of the Diet, appeared in plain clothes. Seigo Nakano, former Vice-Minister of Communications who resigned a few days ago, also attended in civilian clothes.—In fact, a sack coat. It was noted by some that the former vice minister has cast off the burden of responsibility of office even to the extent of shedding his official decorations.

Acting Premier Kijuro Shidehara labored like a schoolboy this morning in preparation for the presentations of the Emperor's message to His Majesty before the reading of the Imperial Message. Arriving early at the Parliament buildings, the Acting Premier summoned masters of ceremony from the Department of the Imperial Household in order to learn proper etiquette for such an occasion. How to walk, what to say, and how to present the message were some of the things that were practiced.

INUKAI IN LIMELIGHT

Most noticeable during the solemn ceremonies in which the Emperor opened the 59th session of the Imperial Diet, was Tsuyoshi Inukai, president of the Seiyukai. Already in the limelight as the lone "dressed-up" figure in the Seiyukai ranks, the aged but active leader drew more attention by skipping hither and thither and looking this way and that in the quiet, serious and solemn gathering.

POLITICIANS ACT DURING RULER TALK

Opening Rites Fail to Halt Backstage Politics

[Special to Japanese American News] TOKYO, Dec. 26.—The Emperor formally opened the 59th session of the Imperial Diet this morning with the customary pomp and circumstance attendant on this ceremony. Streets leading from Chiyoda castle, the great most-enclosed imperial residence in the center of the city, to the Diet building were closed before daybreak, while crowds gathered early to line the streets to view the Emperor ride forth in state in his crimson-hued Rolls-Royce escorted by a cavalcade of Imperial Guards cavalry.

BACKSTAGE POLITICS

While the ceremonial formalities were going on, political leaders were busy backstage laying plans for the coming meetings. Etsujiro Ueyehara was selected by a party caucus of the Seiyukai to head the Seiyukai committee of political affairs, which is the board of strategy for the Opposition forces on the floor of the Diet. Ueyehara, it will be remembered, is the University of Washington graduate who recently brought down a storm around his head when he criticized the Privy Council while acting as parliamentary vice-minister of foreign affairs.

PEER EXPECT BATTLE

The fight in the House of Peers promises to center around the discussion of the government's economic policy. The key position which each of the parties will try to capture is that of the chairmanship of the Finance committee, since that committee by tampering with appropriations can seriously embarrass the Cabinet's economic policy if it sees fit. Hakutaro Hayashi, known to be unfriendly to the present Cabinet, at present seems to hold the inside track for the office and is being covertly supported by the Kenkyu-kai party. The government party on the other hand is pinning its hopes on Marquis Goryu Hosokawa.

HAMAGUCHI RECOVERING

Lion Spends Opening Day of Parliament in Hospital

TOKYO, Dec. 26.—While the Imperial Diet was meeting in the formal opening ceremony this morning Premier Hamaguchi, confined in the Imperial university hospital as the result of the recent attack by a would-be assassin, passed the time in a genial mood with his wife and daughter at his bedside. The premier was able to sit up in bed, and his condition was so encouraging that Mrs. Hamaguchi left the hospital for the first time today after having been in constant attendance since the day of the attack. She is planning to prepare for the New Year festivities, and will have a shelf set up beside the premier's bed on which she will place the traditional New Year's decorative dishes.

FORMOSA TO SEE COFFEE

5000 Acres Leased by Firm for Coffee Plantation

[Special to Japanese American News] OSAKA, Dec. 26.—Japan will grow its own coffee in the future, if the plans of local promoters prove successful. About 5000 acres of land have already been leased in Formosa by the Sumida Trading company of this city. T. Sumida, head of the company, and a group of 16 experts are now in the southern islands making arrangements to cultivate coffee on a large scale.

THE WHY OF DEPRESSION

Harry B. Kirtland, in an interesting little volume organ called Business Building issued by the DeLancey Printing and Engraving company, gives an interesting analysis of the phenomenon of depression. I am trying to present in these articles, from time to time, interesting analyses and summaries that come to my attention from various sources, for I think it is useful to focus in this column whatever thinking is being done in the country on the current economic situation. Here are some high spots of Mr. Kirtland's analysis: "All the income of industry comes from consumers. . . . All the income of consumers comes from industry. . . . Suppose you had two reservoirs, connected with pipes, one pipe carrying water from reservoir A to reservoir B, the other carrying it back from reservoir B to reservoir A. If the flow were even through-

"Business men know this, and that is why, in periods of protracted prosperity, industry leaders (normally) began to trim sail against what they believe is the inevitable coming of depression. They check production, fearing consumers will not take all the goods produced. Workers check their efforts, fearing over-production will put them out of a job. And one fine day that very thing, accelerated by human fears looming up as a big element, a very weighty psychological factor, in the complicated problem, comes to pass. "Then we have depression." In other words, Mr. Kirtland asserts that the common operation of our business system works towards a progressive stoppage of consumer buying. Is this so?
