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T.H. HAS NEW TEXT BOOK ON JAPANESE

Prof. T. Harada and
T. Kunitomo Prepare
Language Guide

HONOLULU, Jan. 7.—A new text in the Japanese language, "Introduction to Colloquial Japanese," written especially for work at the University of Hawaii recently came off the press and is the result of a year's work. Professor Tasaku Harada and George T. Kunitomo of the University's Japanese department.

The new text is designed to treat the language from a different angle than any other texts on the subject. The grammar, composition and conversation elements of the language are all correlated and incorporated into each lesson, making a much better practical foundation for Japanese, than that offered by existing texts.

The introduction takes up the fifty and mother of five, is Japan's woman tennis champion. She arrived in San Francisco recently aboard the N.Y.K. liner Chichibun Maru for an extended stay in California, during which time she plans to perfect her tennis under the tutelage of Howard Kinsey and other Western racket experts.

The text is printed in Roman Script.
