MRS. BRUCE PAYS VISIT AT MILLS

English Aviatrix Is
Mills College's
Honor Guest

OAKLAND, Jan. 15.—Mrs. Victor Bruce, English aviatrix, arrived at Mills College Tuesday, having been enroute by plane since September 25 and flying 11 hours a day. Twenty-one countries were visited by her in her flight around the world before reaching Berkeley.

Mrs. Bruce's mother, the former Miss Jennie Williams, was a student at Mills College in 1880, and it had always been her desire to return to the campus. "My mother is a very bad sailor," said Mrs. Bruce, "and so am I, so my only hope of seeing the school of which she had told me so much and her home in Indiana was to fly."

PURCHASES PLANE

Mrs. Bruce purchased a plane in England and shortly after learning to fly started on her world flight. "I have passed through twenty-one countries and my passport is so full that nothing can be added to it," she said. "In India I had a crash in the midst of a desert. The natives were very savage, but I won their friendship by showing them the alarm clock I had with me to awaken me each day at dawn. When I set the alarm they were frightened and ran away, but later they became fascinated and called the neighboring tribes to see it. After a while, I was sorry I had shown it to them, for they made me wind it all day long."

"On my way to Tokyo I was forced to go 800 miles out of my way because of the maneuvers at Nagasaki where I had hoped to land. The Emperor was there and the people were afraid I would fly over his head, a very bad thing to do, so they made me go by way of Korea.

"From Tokyo to Vancouver I went by steamer and from Vancouver to San Francisco by plane. I crashed in Medford, Oregon, and had to go back to Seattle for repairs. When I get home I can say I have been around the world once, and from Seattle to Medford twice."
