It is quite rare that any newspaper in the world is given such kind and thoughtful attention as was given to us this morning. As scarcity is the essential element in economics, rarity is the first and the last word in journalism. So the following letter makes news, and it tells everything.

"Rag! Bottle! Sacks!" Very familiar indeed, for they are being hollered by none other than the boys of the local Japanese Boy Scout troop 12.

The troop 12 is now undertaking a paper drive. The boys are trying to raise a fund to pay for travelling expenses to send some members of the troop to Sacramento during the Easter vacation when they hold a tract meet in Sacramento in conjunction with the Troop 25 of that city.

"Any outside help in securing papers, bottles, or any junk, for this drive will be greatly appreciated," say the officials of Troop 12.

Those who have anything to throw away, are asked to phone one of the following members of the troop, and they will be glad to call for them: Jiro Misumi, Bay View 1254; Shozo Tsuchida, Kearny 2729; Sunao Iwatsu, West 5942; and Henry Tani, Randolph 1881.

A movement is being started in the House of Representatives by the Selyukai to bring up the question of the constitutionality of a non-partisan man like Foreign Minister Shidehara playing the role of Acting Premier for the Minseito party.

In the House of Peers, on the other hand, only slight attention is being paid to the matter. According to some members, the Japanese constitution does not recognize political parties and such being the case, it does not matter if the Acting Premier is non-partisan. Economic

questions will be stressed in the House of Peers in the coming sessions, it is said. Already 19 leading members of the House of Peers have asked permission to address the House on general policies, national defense, the recent Taiwan revolt matter, business depression, and other matters.

TOKYO, Jan. 22.—A decoration of the first Merit Grand Cordon of the Order of the Rising Sun was bestowed upon Chang Hsueh Liang, war lord of Manchuria, by the Emperor today. Consul General Hayashi at Mukden presented the decoration.
