[Special to Japanese American News] RIVERSIDE, Feb. 3.—Led by the Japanese Association of Riverside, the Japanese community of this city and its vicinity will wholeheartedly support the Beaumont Cherry Blossom festival which is being planned by the Chamber of Commerce and citizens of Beaumont. An 8 acre bowl for the festival is now being purchased for the Japanese park. The event will be held this year on Sunday March 29.

At a meeting of the Riverside Council members last Saturday night, it was decided that the association will do all in its power to boost the festival and have a large representation of southern California Japanese at the annual affair.

"SPEAKING BAD JAPANESE"

The matter of the poor English spoken by a great majority of the second generation led to a discussion on the topic of Japanese language schools in California. Taking profound interest in the subject, the professor had some interesting and penetrating suggestions and questions to offer. "The matter of the Japanese language school is a problem. I have noticed that wherever I go the older generation seem to think that the young folks speak terrible Japanese. They throw up their hands in despair at the kind of Japanese spoken by their children. At the same time, our tests show that the young people do not have encountered such great difficulties and opposition. From that standpoint, I strongly urge that all young people give careful attention to acquiring a good command of English."
