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S. G. POOR IN ENGLISH, SAYS SURVEY DIRECTOR

Dr. E. K. Strong Gives Interview on Recent Study

"In intelligence the second generation Japanese equal the white Americans, I think," said Dr. E. K. Strong, director of the recent second generation survey conducted by the Carnegie Foundation in a large interview with a member of the Japanese American News editorial staff in his offices at the Stanford university.

"FOUR IN SPEAKING"

"In all the tests that have been given, the poor linguistic ability of the second generation have been strongly brought out," continued the professor who has traveled all over California among fisher folk in San Diego, San Pedro and Monterey to the mountain districts of Fresno and Newcastle, or the river district of Walnut Grove.

"SPEAKING BAD JAPANESE"

"The matter of the poor English spoken by a great majority of the second generation led to a discussion on the topic of Japanese language schools in California. Taking profound interest in the subject, the professor had some interesting and penetrating suggestions and questions to offer.

"LEARN ONE WELL"

"I have given this matter a great deal of thought and attention and it is evident that the children are not getting English nor Japanese correctly. To start with, it is difficult enough to have a double standard of languages in school and at home. To add to this a Japanese language school must make it all the more confusing and hard for the second generation.

"Then, why not try to master one language and learn that one well? This, it seems to me, is a serious problem for the parents and the children to consider. If the children cannot learn two languages equally well and perfectly, obviously the next best thing is to learn one language well.—Of course, it is up to the parents to decide but to an impartial observer like me, it would seem that since the children are to live in the United States for the rest of their lives, and the children's children after them, their first need would be to master the English language.

10,000 INTERVIEWED

"Do you young people lean towards white collar jobs?" asked the interviewer. Oh, yes, just like all other young people, was the answer. "But many of them want to be farmers, too." The great problem is that of finding occupations. In that matter, too, there is no difference as compared with the whites. The only difference is the racial factor which must be considered.

CRIME AGES THOUGHT

"How do you think it was the next question. 'By copying the white Americans but by being themselves, by showing skill, by working a little harder than others, by demonstrating their ability,' was the prompt reply.

U.C. PLANNING JAPAN TRIP FOR SUMMER

Professor P. Nahl to Head Art Class Excursion

[Special to Japanese American News] BERKELEY, Feb. 3.—A trip to Japan, Korea and China, for which residents of the state may register as they would for any other course offered by the University of California Extension Division, has just been announced by Perham Nahl, professor of art on the Berkeley campus.

WILL GIVE THIRTY LECTURES

Professor Nahl will give a series of thirty complete lectures as well as conducting the members of the tour party to all places of interest in Japan. He is an authority on Japanese art, having studied it for many years and having recently spent many months in Japan.

Geography and Origins, Legend, Poto-Historic, Sulko Period, Nara Period, Tempyo Period, Kosa Ryu, Fujiwara Period, Minamoto, Kamakura, Yoritomo and Hideyoshi, Ieyasu and Early Tokugawa, Late Tokugawa and Meiji, Japan of Today, Customs and Costumes, The Japanese Spirit—Bushido, Swords, Kabuki, Brocade and Stencils, Ceremonies—Birth—Marriage—Death, Tea Ceremony—Daruma, Sen no Kikyō, Gardens, Flower Arrangement, European Influences, Matahei-Moronobu—Masanobu, Korin—Sotatsu—Senzetsu, Okyo and the Realistic School, Sharaku—Yelazan—Toyokuni—Kunisada, Utamaro, Hokusai, Hiroshige, and Modern Art.

MANY PEOPLE TO COOPERATE

Among the many contributors who will aid Professor Nahl during part or all of the trip will be S. Nakano, official Japanese guide; Hiroshi Yoshida, one of the leading Japanese artists; Munemitsu Yanagi, university professor, lecturer at Tokyo university; T. S. Sen, master of the tea ceremony, fourteenth generation of tea masters of Ekyoku; W. W. Taylor, art collector; W. T. Wang, official Chinese guide; Helen Burton, proprietress of the Camel Bell Shop, one of the wonder places of Peking; Mr. Fukui, host for an afternoon in Tokyo; Mr. Kanaya, host for an afternoon in Nikko.

The course which Professor Nahl is to give will end at Yokohama, and those coming home at that time will return to San Francisco by way of Honolulu. The extension trip to Korea and China will start from Yokohama for those who care to make it. An official welcome to members of the party has been extended by His Excellency, Hon. Riuzo Tanaka, minister of education for the Imperial Japanese government. Details concerning the trip may be obtained from Professor Nahl, Art Department of the University of California, Berkeley.

Japan Outdoor Men Take Up Sport of Skiing from West

Starting in Northern Europe and working its way westward round the world the sport of skiing has now won the hearts of the Japanese. Japan is not only a land of cherry blossoms and miniature gardens of exquisite artistry. 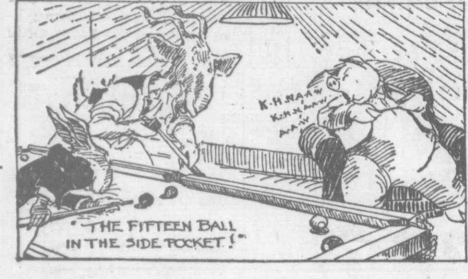
