IS VICTOR IN BOXING

Yuji Imai of Stanford Wins Inter-collegiate Event

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Feb. 7.—Yuji Imai, Stanford university's bantam-weight champion, pummeled his way to a victory over Max Thompson of the University of Nevada in an inter-collegiate boxing here Thursday night. The decision came after a hectic and extremely fast three round slugfest which had the three thousand spectators yelling and standing on their feet. Both fighters showed unusual ability to take heavy punishment, and the verdict was in doubt until the last.

IS AGGRESSIVE

Abandoning his usual tactics of holding back and wearing his opponent down, Imai rushed the Nevada boxer from the start, leading in aggressiveness throughout the fight. But his opponent's toughness and ability to stand punishment made the outcome uncertain until the end when the Japanese fighter's more refined technique and his effective left-hand punches to the body finally had Thompson groggy on his feet.

THIRD VICTORY

This marks Imai's third straight victory in as many starts this season. On beating Mark Kal-Kee, he recently won the Gene Tunney award, donated by the former heavy weight champion of the world. Mark Kal-Kee is the brother of Sam Kal-Kee, the Chinese football star who attracted so much attention from the Japanese public during the recent Showa-Chinese All-Stars clash.
