## DEBUCHI GIVES ADDRESS AT LINCOLN EXERCISES

Japanese Ambassador Main Speaker at Springfield

[Special to Japanese American News] SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Feb. 11.—In his speech at the Lincoln's birthday exercises held here today, the Japanese ambassador to the United States, Katsuji Debuchi, was the main speaker of the day. He pleaded for "Lincolnism in international relations" and predicted that unless nations complemented military disarmament with economic disarmament, they would never complete the temple of peace which nations have been trying to build in recent years.

Ambassador Debuchi explained that "Lincolnism means the extension of ideal humanitarianism promoted by unity and freedom." "Today we can approach the ideal by following Lincoln's path to secure friendly cooperation throughout the world," he asserted. He stressed the fact that while maintaining the freedom and independence of each nation we must approach the solution of our common problems in a spirit of unity."

### COOPERATION NECESSARY

"International cooperation is necessary today in the world," he continued, "where most problems, even though apparently domestic, produce or indirect effects upon all nations." The ambassador found an encouraging sign in the cessation of naval rivalry among the leading powers inaugurated at Washington and furthered at London. He added, "I am confident that sooner or later France and Italy will also adjust their differences and join the three powers in reducing their naval forces."

"There is little doubt," asserted Ambassador Debuchi, "that eventually land and air forces likewise will be regulated and restricted by friendly cooperation, and in such an event enormous expenditures now going into destructive armaments will be diverted into channels of constructive work for the happiness and cultural advancement of mankind."

### COMPETITION DEPLORED

The ambassador called attention to the continuance of "cut-throat" international business competition despite the "staggering economic depression affecting all nations. This suffering world is burdened with economic nationalism leading all nations to the ruinous path of cut-throat competition. They are vying one with another in launching huge swift merchant ships. Where there are few passengers and little cargo, they are outstripping each other in producing commodities regardless of the buying capacity of the consumers."

"Unless military disarmament is complemented by what we may call economic disarmament aiming at removal of pernicious economic rivalry among nations so detrimental to the general happiness of mankind," concluded the ambassador, "the temple of peace which we have been trying to build by international cooperation will never be completed."

### MEMORABLE DAY

In closing, the main speaker of the day mentioned the fact that February 11 is not only the birthday of Lincoln but it is the 250th birthday of the Japanese Empire which makes the day all the memorable for him. He referred to the cherry blossoms surrounding the Lincoln memorial in Washington, D. C. as a happy augury of increasing cooperation between America and Japan in interests of the Pacific and of the world.

The Japanese graduates are: Daniel Tadashi Izu and Lily Yuriko Matsuda, graduates of the Palo Alto high school, and Hideo Furukawa, who graduated from the Channing Intermediate school.

Izu completed his high school career in three and a half years, and is expecting to enter the Menlo Junior college.

The coming graduation party will be held in conjunction with the annual Valentine party of the league.

Mexicans Hold Up, Rifle Sacramento KMT Restaurant

[Special to Japanese American News] SACRAMENTO, Feb. 11.—Two Mexican thugs held up a Japanese restaurant, the K.M.T. restaurant, 1203 Third street, early this morning and fled with \$35 in silver. The establishment is owned by Koteki Saito.

The restaurant is open all night. When the Mexicans came in about 4 o'clock this morning, a Filipino cook was alone in the place. The thugs flushed out a revolver and commanded the cook to stay in the lavatory located in the back of the restaurant, according to the Fillipino.

The Mexicans rifled the cash register and fled with \$25 in coin.

BOY GIVES IN TRIBUTE

Lieutenant Caldwell Remembered by Tokyo Tot

[Special to Japanese American News] WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—(UPI) Last fall, Lieutenant William Caldwell took off from Victoria, B. C., in an army airplane to carry a copy of the Japanese ratification of the London naval treaty across the country so it might be deposited promptly at London. In Wyoming, he ran into a snowstorm and crashed to his death.

The public read of the tragedy and soon forgot it. Caldwell was buried in a plain military grave at the San Francisco Presidio.

But in far away Tokyo, Shigeo Fukushima, a sixth grade pupil, was deeply moved. He sent 70 sen (35¢) to a newspaper to start a memorial fund. The newspaper gave the money to the American embassy and eventually it reached the State Department here.

Officers of the army air corps and the State department were touched by the schoolboy's tribute. They added more money to buy a bronze wreath for Caldwell's grave.

Today they announced they have arranged a public ceremony, probably to be held on the first anniversary of the flyer's death. But the wreath which they will place on his grave will bear only the name of Shigeo Fukushima.

## NORTH CALIF. CITIZENS TO FORM UNION

Meet in S. F. Feb. 28 Will Also Discuss Cable Act

Roused by the pending Cable Act Amendments in Congress, rumors of which are many and diverse in wording as well as import, the various Citizens' Leagues of Northern California have agreed to hold a joint conference in San Francisco on February 28. This was done at the initiative of the San Francisco league which felt the necessity of investigating the matter seriously and jointly and obtaining facts before proceeding on any active course.

Yoshiwara will take off from the Haneda International airport, according to the announcement, and head for Aomori on the first leg of his flight. He will then stop at Nemuro, Chishima, Kamchatka, Aleutian Islands, Canada, and then dash for his destination, the Berlin-Tokyo flight.

The Japanese aviator possesses the certificate of a Class A aviator. The flight is being sponsored by the Hochi, Tokyo's leading daily newspaper, the journal which sponsored Yoshiwara's Berlin-Tokyo flight last year.

According to Yoshiwara, he will use a Junker Amphibian monoplane, which has a endurance power of flying 10 hours at a stretch. He will cover the distance of 12,000 kilometers in 77½ hours during his flight.
