2000 Throng to Witness Fire Demolish Japanese Church on Buchanan St.

Harada Home Burnt Partly in Wed. Morn Fire

Leakage in the gas meter is believed to be the cause of fire which completely destroyed the interior of the Japanese Episcopal Mission on Buchanan street and damaged the office and residence of Dr. M. A. Harada early Wednesday morning. Fire Chief Charles J. Brennan stated that damages would exceed \$7000, and authorities are investigating as to the origin of the blaze because of "suspicious" circumstances. Three alarms were turned in half an hour after midnight, the first one by John Kiyoshi Kaneko roomer in the church at Sutter and Buchanan, the second one by Patrolman Kelley at Geary and Buchanan, and the third by an unidentified bystander at Fillmore and Sutter.

SPREADS FAST

The conflagration at one time threatened the entire neighborhood and was not brought under control until the second alarm was turned in.

Dr. Harada, resident at 1724 Buchanan street, adjoining the church, suffered damages estimated at \$1000. The outer wall was scorched and part of the interior and roof were burnt.

Dr. and Mrs. Harada had narrow escape with their little baby. The only passage to the front part of the house was on fire two minutes after they made their escape, making it impossible for others to enter that part of the house.

MANY WITNESS FIRE

Eiji Sakai, Seizo Murata, Shig Emoto, and Saburo Kido assisted Dr. Harada saving surgical instruments from destruction. Fire was first noticed by John Kiyoshi Kaneko who was reading a book on the top floor of the mission, and was witnessed by 2000 people. What is mystifying many is the fast spread of the flame. It also did some damage to the flat of Mrs. Gordon, below Dr. Harada's office. The church building is the property of Bishop Tesson, and is covered by insurance. The property inside is not insured according to Y. Iwata, treasurer of the church. A similar fire destroyed a car and part of the basement four years ago.

DR. HARADA CLOSES OFFICE

Dr. Harada will close his office for a few days, it was learned today. He suffered a little cut by broken glasses.

Suspicious Fire Occurs at Hayashi Home on Sutter St.

Incendiarism suspected to have some connection with the fire which completely destroyed the Japanese Episcopal Mission on Buchanan street early Wednesday morning was reported to police by Toshihiro Hayashi, 1745 Sutter street. The Hayashi home is located in the immediate neighborhood of the Japanese mission. At about 12 o'clock, a half hour before the discovery of the fire at the mission, Hayashi was awakened by strange odor that curled up from the basement of his home. He rushed downstairs and found a mattress stored in the basement all in flame. He extinguished the fire. It was later found that some unknown man poured gasoline on the mattress and set fire upon it.
