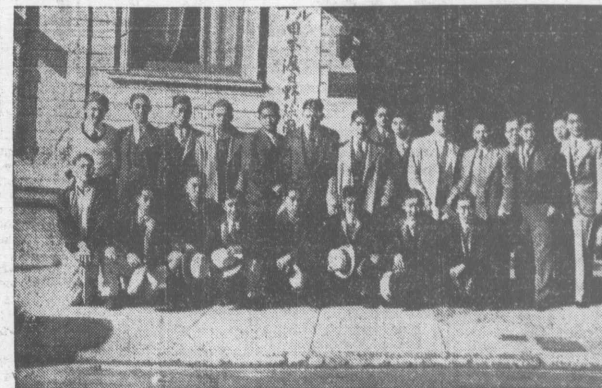

6th Annual Sac'to YPCC Begins Today

Over 175 from Many Valley Cities to Attend Meet

(Special to Japanese American News) SACRAMENTO, Feb. 20.—Approximately 175 young Japanese Christians in Sacramento valley are expected to gather here for the two-day session of the sixth annual Sacramento valley sectional conference of the Y.P.C.C. to be held in this city this Saturday and Sunday, February 21 and 22.

Delegates from various Christian organizations in the valley, including those in Stockton, Marysville, Vacaville, Loomis, Walnut Grove, Florin, and Sacramento, will be given a warm reception when they attend the opening luncheon to be held at the Westminster church on 13th and N streets, just opposite the Capitol park where the same conference was held last year. All activities of the first day of the conference will take place at this church.

Registration desk will open at 10 o'clock Saturday morning. The first day of the conference will come to a close with a "Quiet Hour" at 10 p.m. On the second day, Sunday, a union service will be held at the American Center church on 6th street, between K and L streets, at which time Dr. Hamilton, superintendent of the Northern California Methodist Episcopal church, is scheduled to deliver a morning sermon.
