AT 1ST CHRIST CHURCH

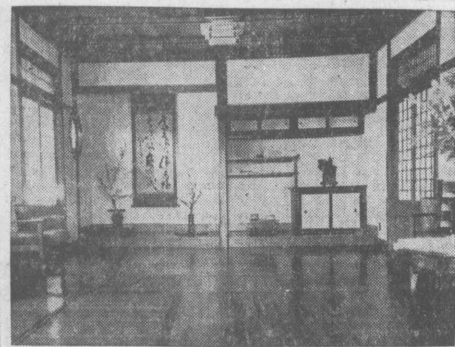
