BALL CAUSE OF ARREST

Little Boys in Pursuit of Baseball Ire Lawyer

Four pupils of the Soko gakuen, Japanese language institute on Pine street, were suddenly taken in custody of the police officers from Bush station late Wednesday afternoon while playing catch-ball on Austin street, a narrow alley back of the school.

They were taken to the juvenile detention home, but were returned to their parents immediately afterward.

CAUSE IS SIMPLE
The cause of their arrest is that the balls they were playing with went into the back yard of Robert Troy, attorney, 1776 Bush street, and the attorney sent for the police and had them arrested.

In an interview over the phone with Troy, he declared: "I have been annoyed by these boys for the last 15 years. They have broken my windows several times, and every time, I told them kindly that it is against the law to play on the street, and that is against the law to climb over the fence and enter someone else's home without permission. I want privacy here. I had them arrested many times before, and they promised that they would not do it again."

NO RACIAL PREJUDICE
"I did not take this action because they were Japanese. I would have done it if they were American or any other nationality. I was surprised by the lawlessness of the Japanese children," Attorney Troy said.

Principal Sasaki of the Soko gakuen is reported to have stated: "We can not blame the children too much. They are only from eight to 10 years old. And I think it is not the proper thing to do to take police action in this sort of case. However, we shall try our best not to have our boys play on the streets hereafter."

Marking the first time that a member of the Japanese Imperial Family has visited the United States, Prince and Princess Takamatsu will arrive in San Francisco May 29 following a tour through the eastern portion of the country and a trip through Europe. Prince Takamatsu is the third son of the late Emperor, and is second in line to the throne, being a younger brother of the present Emperor and Prince Chichibu. Their Imperial Highness will arrive in Los Angeles about May 15 or 16.

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 27.—Their Imperial Highnesses, Prince and Princess Takamatsu, who are expected to be in this city on the 15th or 16th of May, will be royally feted by the Japanese residents of this locality when they arrive here.

ON SUNDAY, MAY 10
The welcome fete program, which is being formulated by the officials of the Japanese consulate, Central and Los Angeles Japanese associations, representing more than 30,000 Japanese in Southern California, will probably be held on Sunday, May 17, for the convenience of the out-of-town people.

The local Shriners' temple auditorium, which has the capacity of holding 8000 people, will be used for the coming affair, according to the present plan.

SCOUTS TO ASSIST
The Japanese boy scout troops here will take full charge of the hall arrangements and the parking of the automobiles. There will be a large band at the entrance of the temple auditorium on the day of the reception playing the Japanese national anthem to welcome the royal guests.

Souvenir badges will probably be distributed at 25 cents each.

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 27.—Plans to organize an associated central organ were made by representative Japanese from different parts of the Southland recently in order to further economic control of truck gardening and its production and distribution.

At this meeting, both farmers and commission merchants agreed to support this movement in an effort to investigate and ameliorate conditions controlling the production and distribution.

The step is being hailed as a definite contribution towards the betterment of conditions in one of the largest Japanese industries in Southern California.
