WHILE the flags of the nation today stood at half mast, Mrs. Alice Roosevelt Longworth expressed her desire that there be no state funeral and that there be simplicity in the burial arrangements for her illustrious husband, Nicholas Longworth, speaker of the House.—The daughter of the fiery T.R., the adored "Princess Alice" could have a huge and elaborate funeral if she so desires and friends and admirers from the whole world will be there to pay their last respects. But she does not choose to do so.—And we respect her for the grief and dignity which lead her to desire a simple burial.

Which reminds us of funerals in our own community. If weddings are a circus spectacle, our funerals are usually worse. The last rites for an outstanding leader of our community usually remind us of an overworked oratorical contest with several dozen speakers and with each speaker saying the same things and each vying to say more than the last speaker—Why, why, why can't we have simple, beautiful, stately funerals where simplicity and brevity themselves are tokens of the love, reverence, and sincere, heartfelt grief of those present? No one comes to a funeral except with a deep sense of mourning for the loss of a dear friend. Why would not silent, but meaningful tribute do just as well as ranting orations?

A head bowed in prayer, the beautiful strains of an organ—if one is a Christian—the burning of incense, and listening to the soothing, comforting chant of the priest accompanied by the deep solemn boom of the bell and the fragrance of the incense, if one is a Buddhist. That, and one's feelings for the departed, — What more is necessary?

BIG WELCOME IS PLANNED

Prince Takamatsu and Bride Arrive in N.Y. Friday

NEW YORK, April 10 (U.P.)—A round of receptions, dinners and luncheons awaited today the arrival of Prince Takamatsu, brother of the Japanese emperor and his bride, princess Kikuko. They were due to reach quarantine at 3 p.m. on their honeymoon trip around the world.

The municipal tug Macon was to take the royal visitors and their entourage off the Aquitania at quarantine and bring them to the Battery. A 21-gun salute from Governor's Island was to greet the Macon.

After a reception at the Battery, the party will proceed to a hotel. Tomorrow the prince and princess will be received by Mayor Walker at city hall and Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia university, will speak.

Monday they will visit the military academy at West Point and return to New York in time for a dinner given them by the Japanese Consul General. Tuesday's schedule includes a visit to Columbia university, a luncheon by the Chamber of Commerce, and visits to points of interest. They will leave for Washington Wednesday.
