COMMENTS

ANOTHER man has made an attempt to kill himself in prison. This man was only in the city prison—usually suicide attempts are made by prisoners in state penitentiaries, but the idea is the same. Who wouldn't prefer death to a life spent behind the bars of San Quentin? Or even a thirty year sentence would seem unbearable to a young man. Therefore, suicide.

This all seems to point to a defect in our prison system. Prisons were ordinarily not designed to punish, you know, but for "penitential" purposes. The wrong-doer was supposed to be placed in a small bare cell and given time and privacy in which to think over his sin and repent.

The idea has changed somewhat. In the usual crowded penitentiary, full of meanness, back-biting, petty intrigues, these seem to be little opportunity for sincere repentance.

NOT only does the prisoner fail to look upon his sins and find them bad—he spends most of his time in prison trying to get out, and when he gets out, the usual prisoner has benefited by his incarceration to the extent of learning the newest and approved methods of crime!

Ho hum. Something ought to be done about this. All these famous and learned criminologists who know so much about stopping talking and begin doing.

We have a perfectly lovely idea why not send all the hardened criminals—the "two timers"—out to some isolated little island, in the Aleutian group, for example, up there near Alaska somewhere. Give 'em enough provisions and farm implements and materials to work with. Have one ship patrol the island to prevent escape—though heaven knows just where they'd escape to—and just leave 'em there to work out their own salvation. The law breakers would soon realize that there is a vital need for Law and Order, and they would have their own rules and ordinances before very long.

Some idea—what?

THE world goes progress—not only in the obvious ways of airplanes, television and radios! The coming celebration at Cortez is one evidence of this other kind of progress. HAMAGUCHI MAY RESIGN

Reijiro Wakatsuki to Form New Cabinet, Report

[Special to Japanese American News] TOKYO, April 11.—Materializing the vague out-look of the political observers of official Tokyo, Reijiro Wakatsuki, former premier of Japan, will formulate a new cabinet, succeeding Yuko Hamaguchi, it was made known definitely when Wakatsuki accepted the position today.

Reijiro Wakatsuki, who acted as chief of the Japanese delegation at the London naval conference and was conferred the title of baron, for his meritorious services, visited Yuko Hamaguchi at the Imperial hospital, where he is recuperating after the third operation performed last night and held a 30-minute secret conference.

Hamaguchi and his cabinet resigned last Thursday. The formal resignation will be tendered to the Emperor of Japan shortly, it is reported. To conduct this formal ceremony, Viscount Makino, the Lord Keeper of the Imperial Seal, returned to Tokyo today from Kamakura, where he was vacationing.

Fresnan Honored for Leadership in Lightweight Group

FRESNO, April 11.—Two boys of the Fresno high school student body, including one Japanese, received the honor of having their names engraved on a large silver loving cup.

The cup was given to the school as a gift from one of Fresno's department stores, and it was decided to engrave upon it the names of the two boys receiving the highest honors in both athletics and scholarship.

Bill Meax was named as the highest of the unlimited group, and George Aki, a Japanese student, was chosen as the leader of the lightweight group.

Salute of Guns Given High Officials in Welcome

[Special to Japanese American News] NEW YORK, April 11.—The United States formally welcomed royalty. Their Imperial Highnesses, the Prince and Princess Takamatsu of Japan, with a welcome that was vociferous in the real Broadway manner at 4:30 p.m. yesterday afternoon.

The Imperial couple, completing an around-the-world tour, arrived from England aboard the Aquitania. A salute was given from the Battery at Governor's Island as the liner pulled through the narrows. Then another salute—this time handclapping and fluttering ticker tape—came as the couple rode up Broadway from the Battery.

MET AT QUARANTINE
They were met at the quarantine by the city tug Macom. On the Macom officially to welcome their Highnesses were Ambassador and Mrs. Katsuji Debuchi, Stanley Hornbeck of the State Department, representing President Hoover; Colonel George W. Burleigh, representing Governor Roosevelt; Henry W. Tamm and Commissioner Phil D. Hoyt, representing Mayor Walker.

Also aboard were Major General Hanson E. Ely, Rear Admiral W. W. Phelps, and the Japanese Consul General in New York, K. Horinouchi. Representing the Japanese residents in America were three leaders of the Japanese residing in New York.

FIRST INTERVIEW
The Macom tied up to the Aquitania, the dignitaries boarded the English liner and bowed to the Prince in the real Broadway manner last night and enjoyed one perfect evening dancing as guests of the Japanese and Chinese Student Clubs of the University of California.

While all the other male members of the Imperial party were in frock coats and top hats, the Prince himself was attired in a dark lounge suit. The Princess wore a printed silk dress of olive blue, a Peter Pan collar, and hat of crocheted straw to match the dress. She wore a necklace of Japanese pearls and carried a snakeskin bag.

As the Macom proceeded past the Governor's Island, a salute of 21 guns was given, and steamships in New York harbor blew their whistles. At the Battery the Imperial couple and their retinue were met by a military band with the strains of "Kimigayo" (The Star Spangled Banner) while three battalions of the 16th U. S. Infantry were drawn up as official guard.

The Imperial Prince and Princess were then escorted in a motor through cheering throngs on Boardway past the City Hall, where an official reception will be held Monday, and north on the Westside Express highway and to the Hotel Plaza.

After a short rest at the Hotel Plaza, where sumptuous suites had been reserved, the Imperial party attended a private dinner at the residence of Consul General Horinouchi last evening.

Today the Prince and Princess will tour the city, spending some time at the Metropolitan Museum in which His Highness has expressed much interest. This evening a big formal reception is being accorded their Imperial Highnesses by the Japanese residents and officials of this city.

Japanese Ass'n May Build New Office Building in City

Construction of a new Japanese association building in San Francisco is being considered, according to a member on the Board of Directors of the San Francisco Japanese association.

The materialization of such an endeavor is held likely in view of the fact that the lease of the present offices on Laguna street has been expired, and the efforts of the Japanese officials to reduce the rent seem to be in vain.

"GARDEN CITY" PLANNED BY OSAKA MUNICIPALITY

OSAKA, April 10 (U.P.)—Osaka has started a movement to make the town the "garden city" of Japan during the summer. Newspapers, public organizations and voluntary bodies are supporting a movement to encourage citizens and the municipality to plant trees, shrubs and flowers changing the color of the city from "gray to green."
