to California with a group of immigrants exactly 61 years ago, in 1870. The party was brought to this country by a Dutchman, named Matsudaira Snail, who had a Japanese wife.

Now, this Japanese girl Okel-san, was 17 when she arrived here, for according to the inscription written on the little two-by-three tombstone, she died at the age of 19, and it is said that she passed away after staying in this country for two years.

It's all interesting, isn't it? The first Japanese immigrant, brought over as an attendant by a Dutchman, who had a Japanese wife, and the first Japanese woman to become the soil of California... and a beautiful girl of 19 at that.

All these things made the writer take deep interest in the affair, and he visited the place one day recently, led by Mr. B. Taketa, our special Sacramento correspondent, who, by the way, discovered this burial ground 10 years ago, and has ever since been endeavoring to make the place popular. Well, his attempt to attract the attention of the Japanese population of the state, and to save it as a historical evidence seem to have been successful, for many are flocking to the place by hundreds at present.

The writer shall attempt to tell his readers the facts concerning this first Japanese woman immigrant, Okel-san, in a series of articles beginning tomorrow. He owes assistance in gathering the materials to Mr. B. Taketa, Mr. H. Shimamoto, managing editor of The Japanese American News, and to Mr. Shikuma Washima, historian of the Japanese immigration in California. Mr. Washima left for Japan recently to collect more historical evidence concerning Okel-san and Matsudaira Snail.

PRINCE, PRINCESS PAY SOLEMN TRIBUTE AT 2 SHRINES OF COUNTRY

President and Mrs. Herbert Hoover Accord Royalty Brilliant State Dinner at White House, Thursday

WASHINGTON, April 16.—Prince and Princess Takamatsu paid tribute today at two American shrines—the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington Cemetery and the grave of George Washington at Mount Vernon.

The Imperial couple, who were guests of President Hoover at a White House dinner last night, motored today through the Virginia hills, abundant with spring flowers and favored with sunshine.

At the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, the Prince laid a great wreath of yellow roses and ferns while the Japanese national anthem was played. On Washington's tomb he placed white lilies and red roses. The party strolled about Mount Vernon estate for some time inspecting the grounds and buildings. After luncheon the Imperial guests visited the famed cherry blossoms on the estate. The cherry trees were a gift to the United States from Japan. The blossoms now are in their full glory.

JAPANESE ROYAL PARTY GIVEN WARM WELCOME

WASHINGTON, April 16.—In evening dress with the ribbon of the Grand Cordon of the Order of the Chrysanthemum of Japan, His Imperial Highness, Prince Takamatsu attended the state dinner given by President and Mrs. Hoover in honor of the Prince and Princess last night at the White House. The Princess wore a pale pink evening gown with appliqued stars of pink velvet.

Besides the President and Mrs. Hoover and their Imperial guests, some of the highest U.S. officials and their wives were present. Among those present were Ambassador and Madame Debutch, Secretaries Stimson, Hurley Lamont, Senators Borah, Reed, Swenson, Under-secretary Castle, Commander Mizuno, Mrs. Hoover, Jr., and Allen Hoover.

CHEERY BLOSSOMS ON TABLE

The banquet table was decorated with pink tulips and Japanese cherry blossoms and around it gathered brilliantly gowned ladies and formally attired men doing honor to their distinguished guests. The table was set with gold service for the 48 guests.

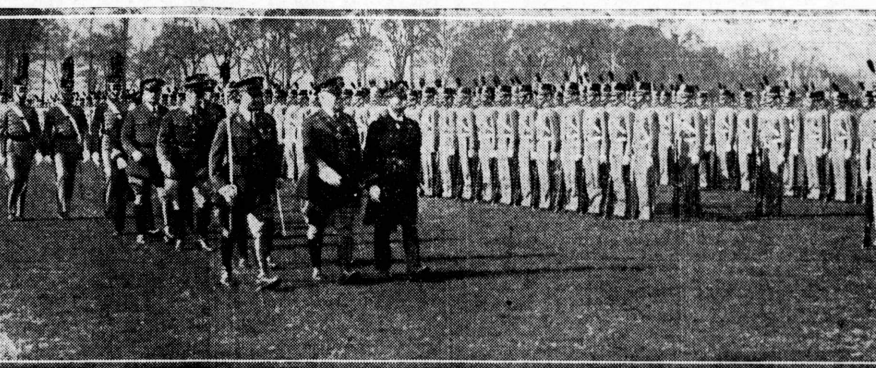

They were welcomed by a group of American officials headed by Secretaries Stimson and Adams and Japanese headed by Ambassador and Madame Debutch. Marine guards presented arms while the band played "Kimigayo."

RECEIVED BY PRESIDENT

GIRLS' EXTRAVAGANCE SCORED BY SAN JOSEAN

"No wonder marriage is on the slump and divorce on the boom, says nearly every man now-a-days. The modern girls have such expensive tastes that the average fellow simply can't afford to marry her. She wants to start off where her mother left off. She's got to have radios, motors, a grand home and everything.

"Indeed, girls of today are pretty, fascinating, so greedy, so exciting, so heartlessly selfish, so willing to repay love with bankruptcy, and ruin, that girls are a menace to civilization, an inspiration to crime, suicide or murder.

"BEWARE OF WOMEN" "About 4,700 years ago some Egyptian said, 'Beware of approaching women; men are made fools by their gleaming limbs.' Some 3,000 years ago Homer said, 'Women are no longer trustworthy'—'Woman was given to man when God was angry.' Some 2,000 years ago Meander, the Greek said, 'Of all the wild beasts, the worst is woman.' The next who followed was a Roman who cried out against woman, 'You clean me out, then turn me out, ruin me, then insult me.' 'What could more exactly fit the complaint of the youth of 1931? If he has been madly in love with her for many days, he has spent tons of money to satisfy her. The more

she gets from him the more she wants.

"MANY CAPABLE GIRLS "On the other hand, there are girls today pretty, fascinating, economical, self-sacrificing, warm hearted, eager to repay love with their own toil, and capable of giving such co-operation that even failure can be turned into success.

"Since marriage is a partnership, an honest man ought not to expect his partner to sign a blank agreement and let him fill in the terms and rules. The word obedience has gone out of sight in marriage. Marriage is not a mere attraction but an economic institution.
