**Reports Maj-General Here for Doctors' Conference**

The average Japanese today lives 17 years longer than the average person did ten years ago, due largely to an improved diet, says Major-General Chikka H. Koldzumi of the Imperial Japanese Army Medical Corps.

"Japan's new life-span, an increase of nearly 50 per cent in the last decade, came largely through the introduction of fat to the national table," said the Major-General. "The life span has increased from approximately 36 to 63 years."

Major-General Koldzumi collaborated with Doctors Osborne, Mendel and McCullum of New Haven, in the discovery of vitamins A, B and G.
