SIAM LOOKS TO JAPAN, U.S.

Chinese Immigration Seen With Alarm by Siamese

TOKYO, May 15.—(U.P.)—Japanese are looking forward to the return of King Prajadhipok of Siam to Tokyo in the fall in the hopes that definite steps will be taken toward improving commercial relations between the two powers.

So far as could be learned here the King did not talk business with Japanese statesmen on his brief visit to Tokyo early this month, but he did indicate his admiration for the industrial progress he saw in the Empire and commented on the great advances Japan has made since his visit here some years ago.

The Siamese, a Japanese statesman told the United Press, feel they must look to this country and to the United States for support and advice in the modernization of their country. For years they have been torn by three forces: French and British commercial rivalry and the growing power of Chinese emigrants within the Kingdom. Both France and Britain, it was said, have longed for a dominant position in Siamese trade and politics. The Chinese have followed an effective method. Chinese immigrants, largely from the Canton region, have settled in Siam by thousands and are rapidly gaining control of distribution of merchandise and the retail trade of the country. A great deal of money is remitted from Siam to South China by these merchants who, the Siamese feel, are not contributing all they might to the development of the Kingdom of their adoption.

U. S. CAPITAL PENETRATION King Prajadhipok, it was said, is alive to this situation and may talk with friends in the United States about it. It is likely he will be open to suggestions of increased penetration of American capital into Siam.
