THE local Japanese American Citizens' league is about to launch a membership campaign according to yesterday's paper. Since the present writer is not one of blessed—blessed by the act of Congress—it's none of his business what the citizens do. But the membership drive does seem like one fine idea. Here's more power to the league and their proposed membership drive!

If ever any one organization stands in a position to be of most value to the second generation community as a whole, the Citizens' league is that organization. Free from any sectarian, local, or professional influence, it should be one of the great all-inclusive organizations binding all American-born Japanese together, a sort of a common denominator to which all the various factions or factions in our community can be reduced—to work together for civic and political ends which vitally concern all of them.

In view of the important part which this organization can play in the community, it would indeed be a pity if it should ever become identified with any one particular clique or social set. The only way to keep the organization free from any such identification is to keep it free from any such identification. Hence, we can view the coming membership drive with nothing but the greatest satisfaction. There is nothing which the league need appeal for, when asking for more members. If the second generation knows what is profitable for them, individually and collectively, it would seem that every eligible person would have been enrolled long ago. Even a rank outsider, ineligible himself to become a member, can but hope for the success of the drive. "In union there is strength" may be a worn-out platitude which only brings a cynical smirk to one's face, but there's still plenty of truth in it.

GLOBE RACER OFF TODAY ON FLYING START

TOKYO, June 15.—A race around the world started today. Two travelers, one headed eastward and the other headed westward, both to encircle the world using only normal existing commercial means of transportation, left Tokyo this morning to see which will be the first to return to the starting point. The race is being sponsored by the Tokyo Asahi and the Osaka Asahi, members of the same newspaper chain.

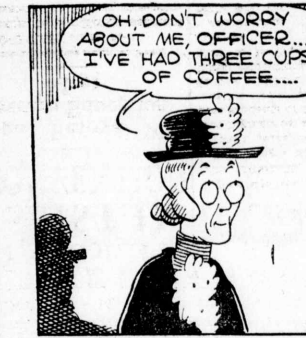
