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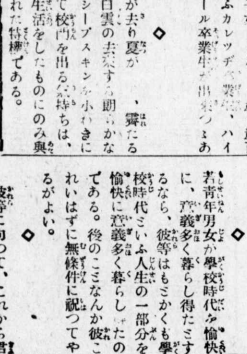

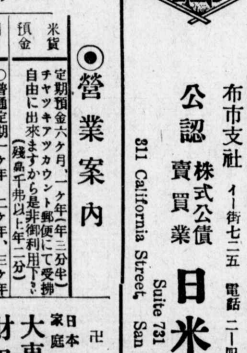

JAPANESE TO DEFEND T. H. TITLE IN JUNIOR OLYMPICS

Pass Through San Francisco on Way to Atlantic City to Participate in Pentathlon

Out to defend two national titles, four Junior Olympic Games champions of the Hawaii Islands, including two Japanese, who arrived here on board the Matson liner Matsonia Tuesday are now on their way to Atlantic City, New Jersey, to participate in the national pentathlon contest to be held there on July 6, 7, and 8.

The two Japanese athletes are Takami Arakawa, 14 year old Junior champion of the Territory of Hawaii, and Denchi Sakauye 15, one of the star performers of the quartette, who is expected to score heavily in the senior division of the Junior Olympics.

Immediately after their arrival at their hotel, the boys went to the Kezar stadium in The Japanese American News car, and went through a series of practices there under the guidance of Charles Hunter, track coach of Olympic club. Arakawa who is only 59 inches tall and tips the scale around 83 pounds was suffering slightly from an injury, but had no trouble in negotiating 75 yards in 9:02 seconds and tossed the ball somewhere around 240 feet against the wind. Denchi Sakauye is said to be able to make the distance in about 8 seconds, and to toss the ball for 280 feet. Both can make around 8 feet 6 inches in standing broad jumps.

Other events in this pentathlon include climbing the bar and basketball goal-throw.

YOSHIWARA FAILS AGAIN

Second Plane Suffers Engine Trouble at Nemuro

TOKYO, June 24.—Seiji Yoshiwara, Hoshi Shimbun's goodwill transport flier, suffered another setback yesterday when his new plane developed engine trouble. This was his second plane, his first one having been damaged at Shinshuri on the third lap of his trip. He was on his way back to Shinshuri from Nemuro with his new plane when he suffered his latest difficulty. Expert mechanics are now being rushed up from Nagoya, but the promoters of the flight are reported to be greatly discouraged with the succession of misfortunes.

HAWAII ASKS BINGHAM ACT BE CHANGED

To Petition Congress to Grant Equality to Japanese

HONOLULU, June 23.—Hawaii will make vigorous representations to Congress to have the Japanese placed under the same conditions as the Chinese under the terms of the Bingham Act. Governor Lawrence M. Judd recently signed a resolution of the territorial legislature providing for a petition to be presented to the next session of Congress to that effect. Victor S. K. Houston, Hawaiian delegate to Congress, will be authorized immediately to prepare the petition.

Under the present Bingham Act, American citizens of Chinese descent are allowed to bring wives from China providing they were married prior to the 1924 immigration law. Japanese are not included in the present wording of the Bingham Act, depriving them of the privilege accorded the Chinese. The present move of the Hawaiian government seeks to amend the Bingham Act so as to accord the Japanese the same privilege of bringing wives from the homeland.

The action is the culmination of an extensive movement conducted by the citizens' leagues.

Roseville High Boy Is Awarded Medal

ROSEVILLE, June 23.—William Furuta, Japanese graduate of Roseville high school, received a citizenship medal from the school last week. The citizenship standing was based on good behavior, attendance, and extra-curricular activities. Furuta served as editor of the school paper while in school, and is a member of the California Scholarship federation. He also took active part in the athletic affairs of the school.
