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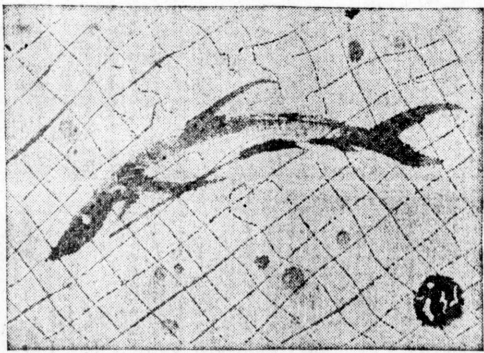

"When a dog bites a man, it is not news; but when a man bites a dog, that is news," is an old newspaper adage. The second generation young people have often been preached to by the older generation, but here is one case where a second generation newspaper has turned the tales and seen fit to preach to the first generation about their duties in providing the right kind of home training to their children. Because of its applicability to first generation parents everywhere and because of its interest to second generation readers in every locality, we are reprinting this editorial which first appeared in the Japanese-American Courier of Seattle—K. K.

IT IS HIGH time now that some of our first generation parents began thinking about the second generation who are on the threshold of life looking into the coming day with high hopes and ambitions of what they shall perform and achieve.

No one can doubt that in the breasts of the young a fresh hope always instill itself regardless of what the task might be. There is always the fire of ambition to achieve and to conquer and to make the world their own. The vitality and energy behind it all speaks of the simple courage and the directness of their ideas.

Yet there is going to come a time in their life when it will become apparent that life is not only a dream or an easy game to play. It is going to dawn upon them that since the struggle for bread and life is begun with the gamut thrown at their feet to challenge the world for existence, the light-heartedness of youth will become heavy, ambition changes to disappointment and hopes vanish into the gray skies.

That is the case with a majority. What are our parents who have come from a distant land and who have the experience of life behind them going to do about it? There is, probably, nothing they can do about it but it should not be lifting as parents to recount to

## KATSUKO SUZUKI'S LOVE DIARY BARED

### Reveals Beginnings of International Romance

As a revelation made for the first time anywhere, we are printing the private diary of Katsuko Suzuki, former University of California co-ed who was ousted from the school recently but whose case is being "held in abeyance" by the university authorities. In the diary, the girl pictures the beginnings of the clandestine love affairs with white students which led to her being forced to leave the university under a cloud. The diary is reproduced here just as it was written without any changes or corrections being made in the author's grammar. The diary will appear in these columns in two installments.—The Editors.

Fall semester: 1929: International night, at Stiles Hall: I was asked to dress up in my own costumes for fashion show—I didn't feel like doing so.—But I did anyway.

Many many people praised my costumes—many said that I was graceful—pretty—some said, "beautiful"; some, "very cute."

It's as usual. People can say anything that they want to. The things they say do not make me cheap or cheaper.—I'm just what I am.

I met four German boys: Mr. K, Mr. V, Mr. B, and Dr. B. Mr. B gave me his address of his country. He is very good-looking. He

talks very intelligently, too. I do not like Mr. K. He is terrible. Mr. V, looks like a duke, very polite and, well, very "mannerful." He talked about the United States of Europe.

Dr. B.—He has pink cheeks. Mr. K. introduced him to me, but I knew him before because he was standing by me upstairs. He wore dark blue suit. His eyes move in all directions.

Sunday, next: International supper: I decided to wear my own costumes again. Mr. B. remembered me and said, "Hello." Mr. K. talks too much. I wish I didn't know him. A Russian chemist remembered me, too.

I was surprised to find that Dr. B. remembered my name. He took the card out from his pocket and said "Good evening, Miss Suzuki." He couldn't pronounce my name correctly, but I said it myself.

Oh! many many people wanted to meet me—just because I looked "cute" in their eyes, I suppose. Some people even came to touch my costume. This is so much like, "America."

Sunday, next: International supper: It is in a way fun to go there, now. I don't know with whom I want to meet the best, but I want to meet some really good people.

Mr. B. told me that he read an article about the United States of Europe, and he said that he will bring that paper to show me next Sunday. He is kind. I like the way he speaks English.

I introduced some of my friends to Dr. B. He seems to like Bernice. I hope Bernice will like him, too.

YOKOHAMA, July 15.—Miss Julia C. Coffey, principal of the Emerson school in San Francisco, left here on the N.Y.K. liner Tatsuta Maru today to return to her work. ## Seattle Japanese to Be Deported

SEATTLE, Wash., July 15.—Hyochi Ohashi and Tatsuo Sakai will have to be deported, according to the ruling of the U. S. District court here. The two Japanese were arrested recently for illegal entry when they returned here from a trip to Alaska. Both had entered the United States illegally previously, but had been rendered immune from deportation by the operation of the statute of limitation which made deportation proceedings inapplicable after five years had lapsed to illegal entry cases occurring before 1924.

However, they were considered to have forfeited their protection under the statute of limitation when their ship stopped for a few hours at the port of Lady Smith in British Columbia on their way back from Alaska. Although the men remained on board their ship while it was in the Canadian harbor, they were considered to have re-entered the United States from a foreign port when they arrived here.

## DEMANDS ON CHINA MADE BY JAPANESE

(Special to Japanese American News)  
TOKYO, July 15.—Japan served her demands on China today for the settlement of the recent affair at Wanpaoshan in which a mob of Chinese villagers attacked a group of Korean settlers working on an irrigation project there, and which later brought on in retaliation the wide-spread anti-Chinese riots in Korea.

COMPENSATION ASKED

The Japanese demands called for a monetary compensation for all damage and injury sustained by the Koreans, a pledge of adequate protection of the Koreans in China against any further attack by the Chinese populace, the granting of the right to Koreans to reside freely in any part of the Kirin province, and the right to engage in rice growing enterprises there. In return, Japan offers to withdraw her consular police from the region as soon as China accedes to these demands.

CHINESE PROTEST

The demands were presented by Hayashi, the Japanese consul at Mukden, to Chang Tso-sung, the governor of Kirin province and the uncle of Marshall Chang Hsueh-liang, the war lord of Manchuria.

Chang protested that the Japanese demands were too severe for him to accept on his own initiative and indicated that he would seek to have the negotiations transferred to the central government at Nanking where other negotiations between China and Japan are already in progress over the settlement of the damage claims arising out of the riots in Korea.

## Irvington Younger Set Has Grad Party
