"TOKYO, Sept. 26.—One person in every 74 in Japan is suffering from tuberculosis, according to a survey completed by the Department of Home Affairs recently.

There are approximately 1,000,000 persons in this country suffering from this disease, the survey shows. Of this number 200,000 are in more or less serious condition, and the annual mortality due to this disease averages more than 122,000 or 19.3 per 10,000 of population.

According to an investigation made on Anti-Tuberculosis Day on April 27, about 50,000 tubercular

persons were found to be in a grave condition, of whom 10,000 were so poor that they could not obtain proper medical treatment.

BRITISH USE BAYONETS IN CHINA RIOT

Troops Charge Into Mob to Protect Japanese

HONGKONG, Sept. 27.—British troops were called out yesterday to suppress serious anti-Japanese rioting at Kowloon, a British concession on the mainland of China opposite the island of Hongkong. The troops were obliged to charge into the mob with fixed bayonets.

The Argyl and Sutherland Highlanders were called into action. Several Japanese were injured by the mob and Japanese goods were burned in the street.
