The Oaklanders, still nursing the sting of the double defeat handed them by the Islanders last year, will be out to win at any cost, but the Wildcats will find an opponent even more vastly improved than the one which beat them last year.

Despite the lack of adequate practice due to week-end "rehearsals," Captain Geo. Miki is reported to have moulded a powerful eleven to hurl against the invading aggregation from Oakland.

GOOD LINE DEFENSE

Alameda's first line of defense is believed to be adequately capable of coping with any situation, and the secondary defense is reputed to be well-nigh impregnable.

U. S. STUDIES MANCHURIA SITUATION

Committee Sent to Get Information at First Hand

(Special to Japanese American News) WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—The United States government has appointed representatives to visit the disputed area in Manchuria to secure first hand information regarding the Chinese-Japanese clash, it became known yesterday.

The appointment of such an investigating commission was revealed in the text of the answer sent to China's note asking for American investigation. This action was taken before the receipt of the Chinese note, and the members of the commission are already on the scene, it disclosed.

The American representatives are Lawrence E. Salisbury, second secretary of the American Embassy at Tokyo, George Hanson, consul general at Harbin, and Myrl S. Myers, consul general at Mukden.

The Japanese government has offered to place at the disposal of the American observers all possible facilities to aid them.

Japanese Planes Bombard Chinchow

(Special to Japanese American News) TOKYO, Oct. 8.—Japanese planes today dropped bombs on Chinese troops at Chinchow in retaliation for attacks on Japanese planes by Chinese forces.

Japan Guards Former 'Boy Ruler' of China

(Special to Japanese American News) TOKYO, Oct. 8.—Reports were received here today that Hsuan Tung, former "Boy Emperor" of China, now living in retirement in the Japanese concession at Tientsin, was in danger of being kidnapped by advocates of a Manchurian monarchy who are anxious to place him forcibly on the throne.

Japanese authorities, anxious to avoid being drawn into Manchurian domestic politics, reinforced the guard patrol about the former emperor's house to prevent kidnapping attempts.

Committee Sent to Get Information at First Hand

(Special to Japanese American News) WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—The United States government has appointed representatives to visit the disputed area in Manchuria to secure first hand information regarding the Chinese-Japanese clash, it became known yesterday.

The appointment of such an investigating commission was revealed in the text of the answer sent to China's note asking for American investigation. This action was taken before the receipt of the Chinese note, and the members of the commission are already on the scene, it disclosed.

The American representatives are Lawrence E. Salisbury, second secretary of the American Embassy at Tokyo, George Hanson, consul general at Harbin, and Myrl S. Myers, consul general at Mukden.

The Japanese government has offered to place at the disposal of the American observers all possible facilities to aid them.
