CHINA JAPAN AMITY ACTION LOOMS CLOSE

League Conciliators
Plead Speedy
Settlement

GENEVA, Oct. 23.—Japan was expected to accept conditionally the latest League of Nations formula for settlement of the Manchurian dispute with China.

Originally scheduled to vote on the resolution Thursday, the League council agreed to postpone action on it until this afternoon.

The resolution conceded all points demanded by China with the important exception of fixing the date of withdrawal of Japanese troops into the railway zone in Manchuria.

CHINESE CAPITULATION

The Chinese must capitulate on this point if the resolution is to be passed unanimously.

TOKYO, Oct. 23.—The Japanese government today instructed its representative at Geneva to accept conditionally the League of Nations proposal to start immediate withdrawal of troops from the treaty zone in Manchuria.

The government hoped to complete the evacuation in three weeks if possible.

Japan's conditions included Chinese acceptance of all treaties and commitments and cessation of alleged anti-Japanese propaganda in China.

The new position represented considerable concession by Japan but included the main provisions of the five points outlined by Foreign Minister Baron Shidehara.
