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GENEVA IS AROUSED BY REPORTS OF MILITARY ACTIVITY IN MANCHURIA

Chinese Spokesman Makes Statement Which Is Subsequently Vigorously Denied

GENEVA, Nov. 4—The Japanese army is "steadily extending and consolidating its grip on Manchuria" and arousing anxiety in Soviet Russia, the League of Nations council was informed yesterday in a communication from Dr. Alfred Sze, Chinese representative.

Since charged Japan had made no move toward withdrawing troops of occupation from Manchurian territory as demanded by the League before Nov. 16.

The Chinese communication was received after fears had been aroused in League circles because of reports that Japanese troops had occupied the Northern Manchurian city of Tsitsihar. It is considered within the Soviet sphere of influence. This report, given to the League by Sze, was denied later in Tokyo.

Makes Serious Charge
In his communication, the Chinese representative said:

"Since the adjournment of the League of Nations council, Japan has not made the slightest preparation for withdrawal from Manchuria. Instead, the Japanese army is steadily extending and consolidating its grip in South Manchuria and is attempting to penetrate into Northern Manchuria, which is causing anxiety in Moscow."

The communication from Sze contained the first information officially given to the League indicating the Soviet Union might be drawn into the Manchurian conflict.

Sze discussed the conflict with Japan at length, reviewing the entire situation since the beginning of Japanese troop movements outside the South Manchuria railroad zone, which they protect by right of treaty and extending up to the latest developments.

Interest in North
Particular interest was indicated in the extent of Japanese activity in the northern area, where the Soviet has extensive interests and wide influence in connection with the Chinese Eastern Railroad which it controls jointly with China. Japan repeatedly has stressed reports that Russia was aiding Chinese troops in opposition to the Japanese. An official protest to Moscow prompted the Soviet to deny the reports.

The situation at Tsitsihar was considered of particular importance because of the recent Japanese troop movements in that direction.

Tsitsihar is a walled city, of about 30,000 inhabitants. It was under joint control of Russian and Chinese officials in recent years.

Refuses to Sustain Treaty
In a separate memorandum to the council, Sze presented the situation in Manchuria as follows:

First, China appointed a commission to arrange with Japan for withdrawal of Japanese troops. Japan refused to negotiate unless the fundamental "five points" of her demands were accepted. These included recognition of the validity of the 1915 treaty affirming Japan's rights in Manchuria.

Second, General Honjo, Japanese commander in Manchuria, notified China that Manchuria's salt revenues totaling \$42,000,000 annually, which is security for foreign loans, must go to the Mukden Association. This constitutes a violation of international obligations, China contended.

Danger of Clash
Believed Reduced

TOKYO, Nov. 4—Danger of a clash between Japan and Soviet Russia in Manchuria was believed alleviated today, despite the extension of Japanese influence northward.

Foreign Minister Baron Shidehara denied that Japanese troops had occupied Tsitsihar, Northern Manchurian city under the Soviet "sphere of influence," as reported to the League of Nations yesterday by China.

It was announced officially that Japanese troops will not advance north of the Nonni River. Tsitsihar is located near the Nonni, a few miles north of the Chinese Eastern Railway.

Diplomatic sources said they believed the Soviet had advised Chinese leaders in Manchuria to avoid irritating the Japanese since the Russian government is involved in completing its industrial program and desires to avoid trouble abroad.

To Answer Brand
The government will answer a communication from Aristide Briand, president of the League of Nations council, asking clarification of a statement that China will not accept the Japanese demand for "sanctuary of treaties" as a basis for set-

Bandits Feared

Refuges from south of Mukden admitted that they were more afraid of Chinese bandits than of the Japanese soldiers.

Autumn is the season for bandits, when the kattir corn stands almost six feet high along the tracks, offering a perfect shield for the bandits.

Official information is lacking concerning the extent of bandit activities. But they held up and robbed several refugee trains and are known to have attacked and looted a number of villages.

Discipline among the Manchurian armies was much better than in 1929, in North Manchuria, when Soviet airplanes scattered Chinese troops. At that time, the city of Hailar and other towns were burned and looted by Chinese troops.
