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WARFARE IS RESUMED NORTH OF MUKDEN TO BANISH IRREGULARS

Chinese Rebels Reported Starving, Fight
Desperately, Menace Important
City of Changchun

TOKIO, Nov. 12—Japanese troops in Manchuria renewed warfare on Chinese irregulars over a wide area north of Mukden today and dug in along the Nonni River against a long threatened attack by troops in Hei Lung Kiang province.

The important city of Changchun, lying some 185 miles north of Mukden at the South Manchurian railroad terminus, was reported in imminent danger of attack by 5000 bandits which defeated an onslaught by Japanese soldiers and bombing planes.

Heavy Chinese Losses
The bandits reported starving continued their attack despite the heavy casualties.

Another large force of disarmed Chinese soldiers was attacked and dispersed by Japanese 72 miles to the northeast of Mukden. Forty-one Chinese were killed, increasing the dead in today's clashes to more than 120.

Four Japanese were wounded. Despite an intensive campaign by Japanese troops to crush the irregulars in the last ten days, the roving Chinese bands in South Manchuria appeared to be widening their activities.

Villages Are Looted

Villages were looted for food. Japanese military patrols were hard pressed in Kungchunglin, Huangkutai and regions east of the South Manchurian railroad zone.

Serious danger was also threatened in the Chinchoro area, near the border of China proper, where heavy forces hostile to Japan were gathering.

Meanwhile, the continued threat of Chinese attacks on Japanese troops in the Soviet influenced Nonni area caused an official announcement that Japan might be forced to move northward and occupy the

Chinese Move Against Entrenched Japanese

MUKDEN, Manchuria, Nov. 12—The Chinese have started moving against the entrenched Japanese forces on the Nonni River front, it was announced today by headquarters of General Shigeru Honjo, commanding the Japanese in Manchuria.

The announcement said the Chinese cavalry from Anganchi, below Tsitsihar, had moved southward, passing to the right of Tashin, where the Japanese are centered, and threatening to cut off the Japanese rear.

"The situation is dangerous, and a Chinese attack is expected at any moment," the announcement said.

May Hem In Japanes

If any considerable force of Chinese occupy a position south of the Japanese the latter's comparatively small force would be hemmed in, and confronted from the north by an immensely superior force of Chinese.

Honjo's headquarters said 20,000 Chinese are now mobilized at Anganchi, with equipment received in the last week from Russia.

"Chinese in Chinese uniforms are arriving at Anganchi from Russia," the announcement said.

The Soviet consulate admitted there are about a hundred Chinese in the Red army but ridiculed the Japanese report.

Headquarters declined to reveal the number of Japanese on the Nonni, but it was disclosed on reliable authority to be about two thousand.

The Japanese therefore are outnumbered 10 to 1.

It is difficult for the Japanese to move up reinforcements quickly because of the single track railway.

Tientsin Is Quiet
After Disorders

TIENTSIN, China, Nov. 12—The city was quiet today after almost a week of disorders and street fighting.

Chinese and Japanese were cooperating in police patrols. Officials expressed confidence that the disorders were ended.

It was said an agreement had been reached among the Chinese and Japanese to a mutual patrol within the 300 yard neutral zone which Japanese established around their concession.

The United States state department was asked to decide whether American troops will cooperate with other foreign forces in patrol duty.

At the close of the program the ladies dressed in their beautiful kimonos, served Japanese tea, cakes and sweets. Souvenir packages of Japan tea were given to the members through the courtesy of K. Watanabe of the Japanese chamber of commerce.

Great credit is due the ladies for the efficient manner in which they planned and carried out their program.

Bridge Repairs Completed

MUKDEN, Manchuria, Nov. 12—Repairs to the Nonni River bridge, where a three day battle was waged last week by Chinese and Japanese troops, were completed today after desperate work by a south Manchuria railway crew, and train service will be resumed tomorrow.

The bridge was damaged by Japanese air bombing directed at Chinese troops. When the Japanese first attempted repairs they were attacked by 5000 Chinese under Ma Chan Shan and a terrific fight ensued. The bridge is on the Tso-nan line.

Rengo Not Official

TOKIO, Nov. 12—An official spokesman for the foreign office informed the press today that the government, although it subsidizes the Japanese Rengo News agency, objects to having it called a official agency.

The announcement was made at the regular daily press conference attended by representatives of the American Press associations, New York newspapers and others. The spokesman said:

"The government objects to calling Rengo the official news agency. We are most annoyed by its irresponsible reports. It is true that we subsidize Rengo but this is because it seems necessary."

U. S. State Dept. Still Optimistic

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12—Undersecretary of State Castle said the state department remained optimistic today over the prospect of a peaceful settlement of the Japanese and Chinese quarrel in Manchuria. His attention was directed to the press reports of imminent battles, but Castle said he had no information to indicate that the Far Eastern situation had grown worse.

Dawes To Represent America As League Of Nations Confers

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12—Secretary of State Stimson today ordered Ambassador Charles G. Dawes at London to go to Paris to confer with statesmen there on the Manchurian situation. The next meeting of the League of Nations council is to be held in Paris, but it was said Dawes probably will not attend it.

Dawes will be in Paris during the council meeting scheduled for Monday, Nov. 16. But the United Press was told informally that the United States probably will not be represented at the council table by Dawes or any other person.

Prentiss Gilbert, consul at Geneva, represented the United States at the last council meeting but the department said he would not be sent to Paris.

Stimson ordered Dawes to Paris because Walter E. Edge, American ambassador to France, is on leave in the United States. Dawes function as explained by Stimson, will be to confer with European statesmen during the council meeting. It is presumed these conferences will deal largely with United States cooperation with the league in Manchuria.

BETTER TIMES AT HAND IS WALL STREET VERDICT AFTER LONG DEPRESSION

Reasons Assigned for Upward Swing in Affairs of Business World—Basic Industries Improving

(This is the first of a series of articles investigating the industrial and business affairs of the country)

New York, Nov. 12—Reviving confidence in the canyons of Wall street here is the real turning point in the depression is imminent, if indeed it has not already arrived.

Faces downcast during the blackest years in the nation's economic history are lighting up.

New Enthusiasm Found
Here in the money capital of the world, there is a new enthusiasm and a conviction that good times are coming soon. Perhaps it is premature, for New York is subject to quickly changing moods. But when warranted or not the feeling exists.

Four factors are most often suggested to account for this upswing in morale:

1. Increasing stability of commodity prices together with recent spectacular rises in wheat, cotton, oil and security prices. One authority handling large financial operations in wheat predicts a rise to a level of 80 or 90 cents a bushel during the winter.

2. Deflation of production costs has brought the price of raw materials to a point where lower prices are possible on finished goods or services.

3. Strong support given the banking situation through organization of the \$500,000,000 national credit corporation; cooperation of banks in helping each other; efforts of the federal reserve board and the controller's office at Washington in adopting a drastic policy to avert recent threatened crisis in some banking centers.

With their triple threat star, Moe Demoto, in the lineup, the Wildcatters' chances of scoring a win over the Islanders took on a brighter aspect today as they secretly prepared for next Sunday tilt. Demoto has already earned a block letter at the Castlemount high school in Oakland where he starred as backfield ace on the football squad during the current season. Being a triple threat star of no mean ability, in his specialty, however, lies in his ability to toss the leather oval with all the cunning and skill of a college football player.

In this section in Moe Demoto and field will be diminutive Mas Sakata who played such havoc in the opening canto, in fact, if one outstanding Showa player were to be singled out, he was the man for he played sensational ball during the whole game.

The game attracted the largest crowd that ever witnessed a grid game in Salinas the reports say.
