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## L. A. TO FETE CITIZENS AT 1932 PARLEY

Murata at Local Meet Promises Big Welcome Next Year

Definite assurance was made that all delegates who assemble at the national convention of Japanese American Citizens federation at Los Angeles late next spring will be given princely welcome, in a report delivered by Goro Murata, Southern California delegate, at the Northern California district convention of citizens which closed its two-day session Sunday at the Yamato Hotel on Grant ave.

A pre-convention gathering will be held by the citizens of Los Angeles in the spring to arrange details of the welcome, including launching of a \$3000 drive to cover the convention expenses, Murata said.

The Southern delegate further declared: "The definite date of the Los Angeles convention will be announced in the New Year's edition of all the Japanese papers. At first the date was tentatively set for immediately after the Olympic games, but it is now probable that the date will be the middle of May."

"Los Angeles will support San Francisco's bid for the convention in 1934." The discussions Saturday afternoon, under the leadership of George Togasaki, president of the local Citizens league, centered around these four subjects:

1. Future Economic Possibilities

2. Future Cultural Development of Japanese in America.

3. What Methods or Plans of Co-operative Development Can We Offer to the Japanese Community?

4. Possibilities of Economic and Cultural Enterprise Among Japanese Americans.

During these discussions many practical schemes were propounded. Another highlight of the day were the addresses on immigration problems. Guy C. Calden, of the law firm of Calden and Elliot, spoke on the quota law. M. E. Mitchell, counselor for the local Japanese Hotel Association, spoke of his practical experiences relative to immigration cases.

An elaborate banquet was held Saturday in honor of the visiting delegates, the main speaker being Jitsutaro Koike, president of the San Francisco Japanese Association. Mr. Hatal of the Hatal Co., and Mr. Kanazawa, manager of the Mutual Supply Co., were the other speakers. Kiyoshi Togasaki, in behalf of the local citizens, thanked the delegates for their attendance at the various meetings. Fred Hirasuna, secretary of the district council, answered with a toast on behalf of the visitors.

## Kon-Ko-Kyo Temple Will Send Gift Bags To Manchurian Troops

Rev. Y. Fukuda, priest of the Kon-Ko-Kyo Temple of the Shinto sect, located at 2078 Bush street, issued an invitation yesterday to the Japanese people of the local community to donate gift bags for Japanese doughboys in the Manchurian warfront.

The gifts should be brought to the Temple by Dec. 20, in order that they may be bundled together for shipment to the Japanese War office aboard the N. Y. K. liner Taty Maru sailing from San Francisco port on Dec. 26.

Each gift bag should contain articles of value of about 25 cents. The bags may be obtained at the Kon-Ko-Kyo Temple free of charge.

## EXCLUSION ACT RESULT OF 'MENACE' HYSTERIA

Unhappily, hysteria and personal politics entered into the problem. Shrewd and oratorical politicians on the Pacific coast saw in the "Japanese Menace" a chance for personal prominence and political advancement. Probably some were sincere, but in their zeal they overlooked the fact that there are wrong ways of attaining an end which may be right in itself.

The campaign they directed was less for the maintenance of American standards of living than for the contemptuous denunciation of the Japanese. By the methods adopted, public sentiment, especially in California, was brought to the point of hysteria.

The "Japanese menace" became a bogey man with which to frighten children—even those of mature years.

Although the so-called "gentlemen's agreement," Japanese immigration had been reduced to the minimum, the new crusaders demanded that the nation's glove be thrown in the face of the Mikado, and that the Japanese be branded as inferior barbarians unfit to enter a civilized community.

Even the United States was inflicted with the mania and when a document prepared jointly by Secretary Hughes and Ambassador Hanhara, referred to "grave consequences" that might result from the enactment of an exclusion law the Senate professed to see in it an offensive threat.

The bill with little opposition, and ended the career of the hapless diplomat.

**Discrimination Resented**  
Embittered as they have been by the circumstances of this legislation, the Japanese have never questioned the right of the United States to make its own law for the regulation of immigration. Only they complain bitterly that the law should be general, and that a people who have achieved the standing as one of the five great powers of the world should not be subjected to the offensive discrimination. They point out that President Roosevelt urged that the ban upon Japanese naturalization be removed, and that every president and secretary of state since his day has opposed exclusion legislation.

## S. F. JAPANESE TO SPONSOR PEACE MEET

Gathering To Be Held At Kinnon Hall on December 6th

The people of the local Japanese community will gather for a mammoth peace prayer meeting to be held on Sunday afternoon, Dec. 6, at the Kinnon Gakuen Auditorium on Bush street, under the auspices of the Kon-Ko-Kyo Temple of the Shinto sect, it was announced yesterday by the Rev. Y. Fukuda.

This peace meeting which will be combined with a memorial service for the Japanese doughboys who died in action in Manchuria, is scheduled to start at 1 p. m., with representatives of leading local organizations participating.

Consul General Kaname Wakasugi will read the official ceremonial message, followed by addresses by prominent local residents. Consul T. Nakamura will deliver a lecture on the Manchurian situation.

The meeting is being supported by the Japanese consulate, the New York News, and The Japanese American News.




