"The Japanese collegians play a fast game, and they are just as good as any of our leading college nine," averred "Rabbit" Maranville, the veteran Braves shortstop, when asked about the Big Six teams.

"Muddy" Ruel said, "I had no idea that the Japanese college teams would show so muc holas, in spite of the comparative late start they have made. I wouldn't be surprised if a World's series will be played between Japan and America before long."

Cochrane Advocates Fight

Cochrane spoke next, after paying high tribute to the ability and sportsmanship displayed by the Japanese players, and remarking on the fair courteous treatment to them all, voiced a word of advice to Japanese students.

He has been the fly in the ointment for every opposing team that Sacramento has faced but the Shoguns will be out to smother him.

The ace in the hole for the locals is "Slim" Nambu their triple threat star. Single handed the above mentioned Nambu accounted for about 150 yards against Stockton, in addition scoring 2 touch-downs. No matter how one looks at it, Sunday's game will be a sight worth seeing.
