Japan builds New Refinery At Cost Of 2 Million Yen

The new refinery just completed in Japan by the Associated Oil Co. and the Mitsubishi Oil Co. Ltd., at a cost of more than \$2,000,000 is operating at a daily capacity of 4000 barrels of crude oil, it was announced yesterday by William F. Humphrey, president of the former company. Mitsubishi Oil Co. Ltd., organized for the purpose of operating the refinery, is capitalized at 5,000,000 yen, divided into 100,000 shares of capital stock of 50 yen parity, owned jointly by Associated Oil Co. and Mitsubishi interests.

KOO, SZE RESIGN AS CHINA'S DIPLOMATISTS

(Special to Japanese American News) NANKING, Dec. 22 (U.P.)—Dr. Wellington Koo, who became acting foreign minister of the Chinese National government with the resignation of C. T. Wang, resigned today after asking the United States to safeguard China's rights. His resignation was announced as the fourth central executive committee took up the task of reorganizing China's troubled government. Dr. Alfred Sze, who accepted the post of foreign minister temporarily while Dr. Wellington Koo carried on the official duties of the office, also resigned. Dr. Sze was occupied with his regular duties as Chinese minister to Paris and head of the Chinese delegation to the League of Nations council during the recent changes in the Chinese National government. His resignation came soon after a statement notifying the League of Nations council that China would resist in self-defense if Japan attacked Manchuria. South Manchurian railway guards dispersed 30 disbanded Chinese soldiers at Kailin station, 28 miles west of Antung. One guard and one Chinese employe of the railway were killed.
