NIPPON ARMY CONTINUES IN CHINA CHASE

Japan Troops Take Two Chinese Citadels

TOKYO, Dec. 23 (UPI)—Advancing across Manchuria Japanese troops and bombing planes today captured two Chinese citadels and ordered warships into action to head off the beaten defenders.

Opposite Citadel

Advices from Yinkow said that Japanese had occupied the citadel at Tienchuantai, in south Panshan, disarming Chinese soldiers.

From Halching it was reported that another wing of the Japanese front had taken the Nucheng citadel, while airplanes continued a bombing foray westward along Liao river.

Cruiser To Sail

A cruiser, two flotillas of destroyers, an aircraft carrier and a special service ship based at Kure and Sasebo, within cruising distance of ports near the Manchurian front, were ordered to prepare to sail for Chinwangtou. The order was believed intended to cut off a retreat by the Chinese.

Earlier in the advance, Japanese troops captured Wakumen, one of largest cities north of Mukden, the center of Japanese activities.
