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## YOUTH, 21, IS SHOT IN L. A. HOLDUP TRY

### Takase Wields Shotgun as Two Break Thru Window

(Special to Japanese American News) LOS ANGELES, Jan. 6.—Eddie Nakashima, 21, was shot, and Sumio Matsuki, 32, was captured, by M. Takase, proprietor of the Ichiriki cafe at 823 East Tenth street, in what Takase declared to be an attempt at robbery, occurring on Saturday, Jan. 2.

The two alleged robbers live at 521 East Tenth street.

Discovering that one of the windows was shattered, Takase earlier in the day, suspected that a burglar was attempting to enter the cafe.

Armed with a gun, he hid himself to waylay the alleged bandits, who appeared on the scene about 6:30 p. m.

When the two intruders broke through the glass, Takase fired, wounding Nakashima. Takase declared he was surprised to find that the two men he had shot and captured were Japanese.

George Nakashima, brother of the wounded youth, was held for questioning by the police.

I. Kawaii with 11 digits was the high point man for the visitors, while Donald Toyoda with 9 markers was Fowler's high point man.


The double header finishes the basket ball season for this year, except for a return game with Bakersfield, which is being considered by the local club to be played in the near future.

## FOOD SEEN IN PROTEIN PILL BY TOKIO MAN

### Synthetic Nourishment Discovered By Scientist

TOKYO, Jan. 6.—The dream of scientists for ages may come true, and Japan may completely solve her weighty problem of food and population by the discovery of concentrated nourishment in the form of synthetic protein, said to have worked marvels in experiments with mice conducted by a Japanese scientist here.

The discoverer, Tsuguro Maeda, 26, is a graduate of the school of agriculture of the Tokyo Imperial university. After receiving his degree he entered the Tokyo Institute of Scientific Research, where he propounded the theory that protein, heretofore obtained only from plant and animal tissues, could be made by chemical process.

Having succeeded in producing this synthetic protein, he next experimented with mice to test its value as a nourishment. He fed six weeks old mice with it and within six months they each gained 230 grams in weight. Compared with mice fed on ordinary food, those taking the synthetic nourishment proved to be much more vigorous, alert and superior in every way.

The scientist declared in an interview with the press: "When my process is perfected, a sprinkling of this nourishment, in powder form, on scanty food of the poorer class of people in Japan will enable them to remain healthy and happy despite the oppression of hard times. By manufacturing this product cheaply and in abundance, there will be no more undernourished people in Japan. Perhaps the day may come when busy people will not take food at all, but will simply take a few tablets of this nourishment at meal time and go on with his work."

## EDITORIAL

### A MATTER OF LITTLE MISUNDERSTANDING

According to press dispatches from Mukden, a United States consul, Mr. Oliver B. Chamberlain, was struck by a Japanese guard while on his way to assume his post in Harbin. While it is yet too early to pass judgment on this untoward incident—and we cannot do so justly with the scanty information on hand—it is nevertheless certain that Japan has everything to lose, and nothing to gain, in provoking even a semblance of ill will of the United States at this hour of crisis when Japan needs all the sympathy she can obtain from America.

It is quite probable that this incident, greatly exaggerated by the press, began with a little misunderstanding on both sides. The Japanese soldier, rightly trained under a stern discipline, has all the strength and weakness of the old Samurai. He is brave, gallant and proud. Given ordinary civility, he greets both friends and foes alike with the manners of a gentleman. But let there be a hint of rudeness, and the old fires of racial pride flare in him.

Under these circumstances, we can easily imagine how a slight misunderstanding, created by the difference in American and Japanese viewpoint regarding good manners, should put flame to a deplorable incident, around which the American war correspondents are brandishing their tomahawks and dancing in glee.

## POWERS MAY SEND NOTES TO NIPPON

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Secretary of State Stimson, in reply to questions, said today he considered the Japanese expressions of regret for the beating of Consul Chamberlain by Japanese soldiers as tantamount to an apology.
