CHINA DAILY NEWS PLANT BURNT DOWN

Japan Soldiers With Bayonets Ban Riot Repetition

TSINGTAO, China, Jan. 14.—The center of the Sino-Japanese conflict shifted yesterday to Tsingtao, history making port in Shantung province which Japan wrested from the Germans in 1914.

All day long steel helmeted marines, with fixed bayonets, patrolled the streets of this city, and the flat roof of the Japanese consulate, bristled with machine guns.

These extraordinary precautions were taken to prevent repetition of rioting in which a Chinese newspaper office and the headquarters of the Chinese Nationalist Party were burned by Japanese demonstrators.

Rise of Nationalism Is Reaction To U. S. Policy

The new renaissance of nationalism in Japan is one of the reactions to the United States' immigration policy, according to Dr. Harvey H. Guy, director of the Institute of Social and Religious Research of New York, who addressed a recent meeting of the immigration section of the San Francisco Commonwealth club.

Dr. Guy has just completed eight months' study in Japan. He declared in effect: Japanese statesmen will not be satisfied until the inclusion of Japan in the Quota law is accomplished.

The average Japanese knows little and thinks little of our immigration policy. While he may resent it, at present it is not a matter of much concern to him.

If America changed her policy in regard to silk, what we do about immigration might be forgiven; for though one affects national pride the other is of prime importance to the national pocketbook.

Perhaps the greatest reason for Japanese resentment lies in sentiment. They want to walk with Europe and America, and they think we are making them walk with India and China, and they don't like it.

Showa Manager Bares Prospects in The Yoke Choy Tilt

With the approach of the annual Showa-Chinese football game, there seems to be much speculation in the air as to the comparative strength of the opponents and the ability of the individual players.

Managers and critics have selected many Showa players on the all-opponent and all-Northern California mythical eleven. Their intentions were good, but there seems to be a wide disagreement in their choices.

For instance, Tommy Matsuda, Link Tokunaga, Sam Kariya, and Benny Matsuda were all selected for the center position of the first string by one critic or another; yet other critics did not mention some of these sterling players even on the third team. So much for the players.

There is also much talk of the strength of the team itself. Having been with the boys for five years, I shall try to present the inside story of the team and individual players between now and the big game.

Water Boy's View My views will be from the standpoint of the water boy, who has the best chance of watching the conditions of the players on the field. Repeatedly I have been misrepresented as being the Showa pilot; but Showa has his pilot—an unusually good one—in Coach Frank Wilton, besides Captain Sim Nambu, Shig Elimoto, Toshi Sato, Kay Yama and Fusaji Inada, who in one game or another have led the Showgas to high honors on the field.

WAR TRACED TO NIPPON'S 1894 POLICY

Record of Manchuria Recalled in The Present Row

BERKELEY, Jan. 14.—The purpose of Japan in Manchuria, despite its protestations of temporary occupancy, is to acquire this tremendous territory for itself in accord with a vision of "Manifest Destiny," which was stated as long ago as 1854.

This is the opinion of Dr. E. T. Williams, professor emeritus at the University of California, expressed in an article, "Japan's Interest in Manchuria," written for the January number of the Campus quarterly magazine, The University Chronicle.

In seeking the real cause of Japan's actions, Professor Williams points out that both Russia and Japan have looked with acquisitive eyes on Manchuria for generations. Manchuria is some 448,000 square miles in area, larger than California, Nevada, Oregon and Washington combined. It is a land of tremendous potentialities, and has a population of some 32,000,000 people.

As early as 1894, he adds, Japan's leaders were expressing the opinion that expansion of the empire was a necessity in strengthening the government. One of these leaders, Shoin Yoshida, expressly advocated the taking of Kamatsuka and the Kurile Islands, the compelling of Korea to pay tribute, and the taking of part of Manchuria, Formosa and the Loo-choo Islands.

Consciously or unconsciously, Japan has followed this policy. Korea already belongs to Japan, and it was taken by similar steps to those now occurring in Manchuria. It was not Prof. Williams' intention to accuse Japan of inhuman tactics. He asserts that such tactics are unfortunately too human, and have characterized history of many ambitious nations. He cites particularly the nationalistic policy of Prussia before the world war, which Japan has taken as a model, and also the policy of the United States in gaining control of Texas and the Southwest from Mexico, and the Panama Canal zone from Columbia.

Dr. Williams was consul general at Tientsin, and secretary of the American legation in Peking, for short periods, served as assistant affairs in the United States department of state, and finally became chief of this division for a term of four years. He came to the University of California as a member of the faculty in 1918.
