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RUSS SEEKS AMITY PACT WITH JAPAN

Tokyo Has no Design
On Russia Says
Inukai

TOKYO, Jan. 16—Special to The Japanese American News—Premier Inukai today told the Soviet ambassador here that Japan harbor's not an iota of thought for aggression into Russian territory, and that therefore such a pact as suggested by U. S. S. R. for declaration of non-aggression between the two countries would be unnecessary.

TOKYO, Jan. 16 (UPI)—A Soviet proposal for a Russo-Japanese non-aggression pact was confirmed today by the Japanese government.

The proposal was made by Maxim Litvinoff, Soviet commissar for foreign affairs, to Japanese Foreign Minister Kenichiro Yoshizawa when the latter was in Moscow enroute from Paris to Tokyo.

The Japanese position could not be forecast. First reaction was that Japan is a non-aggressor and that such a pact is unnecessary.
