JAPAN ARMY SWEEPS 500

Unification of Manchuria Into New State, Plan

MUKDEN, Jan. 18.—Japanese troops beset lately by Chinese irregulars in Manchuria, virtually wiped out 500 Chinese near Yen-tai, 25 miles south of Mukden, yesterday.

Unification of Manchuria into a new state, either autonomous or entirely independent of China, was proceeding, meanwhile, under Japanese protection.

In their campaign against the irregulars, the Japanese were bombing Yushu, said the English Telegraph Agency dispatch. Provincial Manchuria forces threatened to advance on Harbin, unless the local government surrendered.

N.B.C. Hookup

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—The first broadcast ever made from the actual scene of military hostilities will be heard throughout the United States next Wednesday over a National Broadcasting Company network, when Floyd Gibbons, Universal Service staff correspondent, and General Shigeru Honjo, Japanese commander in Manchuria, halt their activities near Mukden to speak through the air on the NBC microphone.

The program will be carried from Mukden by wire line to Tokyo, and by short wave length from there across the Pacific to the NBC key station in San Francisco, where it will be put on the Coast to Coast network.
