SECURITY IS STRESSED IN HONJOTALK

Manchurian Blood Is Sucked by Bandits Says General

General Shigeru Honjo, commander of the Japanese army in Manchuria, and Floyd Gibbons, American war correspondent, told the world Wednesday about the war in the Far East.

In their joint radio broadcast from Mukden, heard in the Bay region through KPO, Gibbons introduced Honjo, who declared in part:

"I am a soldier. Words are not my medium. But I am happy to extend greetings to our unlimited multitude of friends in America and other parts of the world."

National Security

"Our primary purpose in Manchuria is to strengthen our national security by clearing out the menacing forces that disturb peace and order, endangering the rights and interests of Japan and the lives of her nationals."

"At the same time, our aim is to revive and regenerate 30,000,000 people whose blood has been sucked for many years past by brigands and bandits."

The reason for our entry into Manchuria are many and deeprooted. We were forced to take a hand because of the provocative activities of military brigands who have stabbed Manchuria and shorn Japanese of their security there."

Land of Promise

"Manchuria can be made a land of promise; a land of equal opportunity. There are 90,000,000 Japanese at home who are interested in Manchuria, and there are countless nations of other nations. America is interested, and we appreciate the American spirit of justice, righteousness, humanity and peace that will aid in developing this land of milk and honey."

"I am happy to speak over the initial radio broadcast that links the United States, Manchuria and Japan. I am gratified to know that this will further friendly relations between Tokyo and Washington and reach an understanding audience. We have much to accomplish."

Gibbons translated the general's speech and began his own talk. He said:

Japanese Puzzled

"The Russo-Japanese war was about 30 years ago. My Japanese friends, some of them thinking America is unfriendly to Japan, have asked me why America was sympathetic then to Japanese interests and seems now to be more friendly to the Chinese."

"So I tell them this. There's no one of us who doesn't pity the under-dog—the little fellow. The Japanese soldier was the fellow thirty years ago, and we were right with him."

Chinese Underdog

"Even though there are 250,000 Chinese troops in Manchuria, or were when this thing started, and only 15,000 Japanese troops are here now, there's no doubt who is the under-dog. China is unable to take care of herself in a military way."
