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S. F. CITIZENS ELECT NAME FOR LEAGUE

Will Aid in Cutting U. S. Red Tape In Travel

The new American citizens league of this city adopted a new name, the Japanese American citizens league, in conformity with the provisions of national organization, at a supper conference held Friday night at the Showa Low on Post street.

George Terasaki, president, opened the meeting with a brief outline of the league's activities for the year 1931, stressing the passage of the Cable act in Congress largely thru the support of the Japanese American citizens leagues of the Pacific coast. This act permits reinstatement of citizens' status under certain conditions to Oriental women who have forfeited it by virtue of marriage to aliens ineligible to citizenship.

Deputation Gets Results
Terasaki also declared that local citizens' deputation to the cities in Northern California in the interest of forming additional chapters bore abundant fruit in the recent establishment of leagues in several Bay cities.

A nomination committee will be selected shortly for the forthcoming annual election to be held in February.

Letter to Kahn
Among the more important work before the league is support of a movement to eliminate some of the red tape, which at present exasperates citizens of Japanese ancestry traveling between this country and foreign lands, it was announced by Terasaki.

The local league will send a letter to Congressman Kahn, expressing appreciation for his past good office and requesting careful study of the present measures before Congress seeking to protect the welfare of the Japanese American citizens.

Here is a summary of the bills introduced in Congress affecting the new Americans:

Bills in Congress
H. R. 304: Representative Victor Houston of Hawaii: To admit as non-quota immigrants the wives of American citizens provided they were married prior to May 26, 1924. At present such status is given only to Chinese wives of American citizens.

2 H. R. 4675: Representative L. C. Dyer of Missouri: To admit as non-quota immigrants wives of American citizens, even though ineligible to citizenship. This applies to Japanese wives of American citizens.

3 H. R. 203: Representative Victor Houston of Hawaii: To permit the entry of wives and parents of American citizens even though such relatives are by race ineligible to citizenship.

Widowed Mother
4 Senate 991: Senator M. Tydings of Maryland: To admit on non-quota basis widowed mother of American citizens and unmarried minor children of American citizens.

5 H. R. 5112: Representative Oliver of New York: To permit an alien woman who while on a visit to the United States has married an American citizen to change her status to that of a non-quota immigrant without leaving the United States.

Seiyukai Victory to Cause Slump, Is Belief

There will be no radical fluctuations in the value of the Japanese yen until the general election in Japan on Feb. 20, it is believed in the financial and business circles here.

The dissolution of the Diet influenced the exchange Friday only to the extent of a drop of 50 cents, the value of 100 yen falling from \$38.50 to \$38.00.

It is the belief of those close to the inner circles of finance that victory of the Seiyukai party in Japan at the forthcoming election would mean a sudden and somewhat radical crash of the yen. On the other hand, victory for the Minseitō, with its program of retrenchment and non-embargo on gold shipments would materially raise the value of the yen, perhaps to a point near par.

In the meantime, there will be a slump in the international trade between the United States and Japan due to the apprehension on the part of the importers and exporters as to the ultimate value of the yen following election.

YEN WILL BE STABLE TILL NIPPON VOTE

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500 MARINES ARE LANDED IN SHANGHAI

Sea Forces Added to Boycott of Japanese Goods

SHANGHAI, Jan. 23. (U.P.)—Japan strengthened its war craft forces off the Shanghai bund today and landed an additional 500 marines here in an effort to crush China's anti-Japanese boycott of goods.

Equipped with all accoutrements of war, the marines were put ashore from a Japanese cruiser, which, with four destroyers, had anchored here to reinforce four other ships already lying ominously in the roadstead.

War Moves Begun
The marines, bringing the Japanese complement to 1400, were quartered on private Japanese property after being refused space on the volunteer corps range.

Along the river front were signs of possible hostilities. Trenches were dug and sand bag barricades thrown up at strategic points. Meantime, many Japanese women and children were quitting Shanghai.

Satisfaction Demanded
The immediate cause of the Japanese moves was a Japanese demand for satisfaction for anti-Japanese demonstrations which were followed this week by Japanese outbursts against Chinese and their property and by the killing of one Japanese, two Chinese and the wounding of others, including British police.

The Japanese aircraft carrier Natori was expected here Sunday. Four Japanese warships were in port before today's arrivals. The Oh! had 500 marines aboard, supplementing the 900 marines already in Shanghai.

Retail Gas Price In S. F. Set at 16 to 14 Cents

Retail gasoline prices in San Francisco were stabilized today at 16½¢ a gallon following sudden action Friday to end a new price war.

Independent distributors were said to have warned dealers to take down signs offering cheap gas on penalty of receiving no more gasoline deliveries.

Gas has been selling at prices ranging from 12½¢ to 14 cents a gallon.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 23 — A large block of service stations here were selling gasoline for 12c today, another large group asked 13c and the majority held for 14c.

The retail price was 18c a gallon when the war started a week ago.

TOKYO, Jan. 23.—The University of Meiji, one of the five leading universities in the Japanese capital, established a department of journalism in the College of Letters beginning this new term.

The party will take special interest in the education of the second generation Japanese in America. It will set sail for Hawaii in July and attend the conference of International educators to be held in Honolulu. Following the conference, the party will proceed to California.

The party expects to conduct lecture meetings while in the United States.
