5 YEAR PLAN TO REVIVE INDUSTRIES

Nippon Will Launch Gigantic Program Under Seiyukai

TOKYO, Jan. 25—A gigantic 5-year plan for reorganization of industries somewhat similar in nature to the famous formula of Soviet Russia will be undertaken by the newly seated Seiyukai party administration in an effort to advance the prosperity of the Empire, it was disclosed yesterday.

Concrete Plans
Tsunao Maeda, minister of Commerce and Industry, yesterday ordered Vice Minister Yoshida to formulate concrete plans, assembling materials from the projects of the old Minseito cabinet as well as those allied with the policy of the government party.

Outline of Plan
A general outline of the plan includes:
Formation of basic policy relative to steel industry. Raising of tariff. Program of full production at the Yawata Iron Works. Formation of program for oil refinery. Organization of plans for minimum manufacture. Reorganization of machinery for industrial research. Commencement of domestic automobile industry. Thoroughgoing rationalization of the major industries. Stimulation of both industry and foreign commerce.

Kendo Experts will Organize Northern California League

Kendo enthusiasts and experts holding recognition of the Butokukai of Tokyo will organize a Northern California kendo club, under the title of Yuden-aha Kai, in this city during the early part of next month, according to plans now under way here.

Promoters are now formulating plans for a mass meeting of the experts in this art of Japanese fencing, followed by a formal inauguration exercises of the society.

Tatsuno received 96 points, the second highest point being given to a contestant from the Park Presidium Y. M. C. A. of this city.

Japan's Rejection Of Peace Treaty is Deplored in Moscow

MOSCOW, Jan. 25—Investia, government newspaper, said today if Japan rejected the Soviet proposal for a non-aggression pact, as predicted in the Japanese press, it would be a blow to the question of peace in the Far East.

The newspaper said public opinion of the world already regarded the Japanese policy in Manchuria as endangering peace.

"We think," it said, "that Japan would regret such a step, taking consideration of its own interests because it would further convince the masses of the world that it has only aims of occupation and does not want its hands tied."

3 TILTS AND BALL DRAW BIG CROWD

JAAU Tilt Winners Are Nissei, OSD And Y. M.

J. A. A. U.'s bargain Sunday was run off successfully with three well attended hop games at Kezar and a full house for their dance at Kinnon hall in the evening.

Nissei dragged the Blue and Gold in the mud by the count of 23-18 in a slow opener. O. S. D. nosed out the Merritts by the margin of a last minute basket, 36-28, while the Sutter street Y outlasted the Showans 48-20.

Nabby Ide, O. S. D. back court man, who had been having hard luck all afternoon with his shots, sped up the side line and let fly a corner shot that sank through the basket as the final whistle sounded, giving him no little satisfaction.

The exciting finish of the Oakland games had the fans on their toes. With the same sense of excitement in the air, the Y partisans and the Showa backers made things lively as the last game of the triple header got under way.

It was evident from the outset that the Y lads were pepped up for the game. Ray Kaneko, Zaiman and Hiseishi Moriama looped three long shots in short order. Then Ray Kaneko pushed in a couple more of push shots from under the basket on two successfully executed tip-off plays.

In that first quarter the Showa fellows must have felt that it was raining baskets, the Y lads ran up a score of 20-5. Every time a Y man shot, the ball went through the hoop. It happened with such regularity that instead of commenting when they sank their tries, one of the spectators shouted when they missed. Strange to say, during the opening quarter, that spectator had only one or two occasions to speak.

Coasting along after the initial frame, the Y lads won as they pleased. Although the final score indicates a track meet, Sam Kariya for the Showans and Kay Yamaguchi were all over the floor striving to even things up.

CHEN QUILTS CHINA POST DUE TO ROW

SHANGHAI, Jan. 25—The Chinese foreign minister and premier both resigned today while 1400 Japanese marines patrolled the waterfront here and 10 Japanese warships lay off shore to enforce a Japanese ultimatum by drastic naval action.

Eugene Chen, foreign minister and premier Sun Fo resigned. It was announced because they could not break diplomatic relations with Japan, could not invoke an international boycott against her or otherwise take positive action.

Situation Tense
The tense situation created by the resignations was heightened when General Ming-Shu, commander of the crack 19th army troops now stationed in Shanghai issued a statement that he would support Chen and Sun Fo.

Japanese Consul General Mural, in conference with Mayor Wu Tzu-Chen demanded an immediate reply to the ultimatum. The mayor put him off with the promise to reply as soon as possible.

JAPAN TO TAKE PART IN OLYMPIC ART EXHIBITION

Japan will compete in the Prize International Art Exhibition to be held in Los Angeles as part of the World Olympic Games, it was announced by the Japanese committee in Los Angeles.

Continuing for two weeks, from July 31 to Aug. 14, the exhibition at the State Museum will contain displays of many forms of art from practically every part of the world, with Japan playing a not insignificant part.

Painting Exhibit
The exhibit includes works in the calm of painting, sculpture, architecture, music, and literature.

The Japanese paintings will include not only those of purely Japanese and Oriental origin but also modern oil colors.

Pre-Exhibition Display
A pre-exhibition display for the purpose of selecting the best materials will be started from April.

NANKING, Jan. 25—Former president, Chiang Kai Shek, who resigned in disgrace five weeks ago, returned in triumph yesterday to help save the Chinese government from financial disaster.

Refusing to comment on the significance of his act, he went into conference with officials of both the Nanking and Canton factions and they deliberated on measures which would avert another government upset and preserve Chinese credit.
