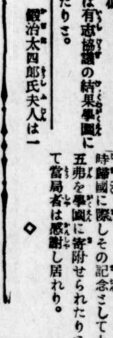

NORTH JAPAN HOLDS LURE FOR SKIERS

Prof. Sato Describes Winter Sports in Native Land

LAKE PLACID, Jan. 28—It does not seem natural for the Orient to produce formidable speed and figure skaters, ski jumpers and runners, but Japan has done it for the Olympic winter games.

"You don't seem to understand here," patiently explains Prof. M. Sato, manager of the team, "that Japan consists of a number of islands running north and south. It is the Orient, true; but not always very warm. The climate of northern Japan corresponds to about that of Canada."

Prof. Sato, member of the faculty of a university of Tokyo, says that skiing is very popular there, but that northern Japan holds the lure for skiers. The temperature drops as low as 20 to 30 below zero.

"Figure skating in Japan has not developed as far as speed skating and skiing," he explains, "because in all Japan there are but two indoor ice rinks, one in Tokyo and the other in Osaka."

"This is not as bad as it sounds, because our figure skaters come from these two cities and naturally, need only one rink for practice. The rinks, at least, are where they are needed."

Skating Popular in Japan

Prof. Sato, who made a record of 46 seconds for 500 meters in Helmingers last year, is only 20 years old. While T. Uruma, the veteran of the team is 28.

T. Kitani, from Manchuria, is the captain. Along with T. Kawamura of Tokyo, they make up the speed skating delegation and compete equally well at all distances from 500 to 10,000 meters.

The figure skaters are K. Omatsumu and R. Ohitani, both students at the University of Tokyo.

Of all the winter teams quartered at Lake Placid, most of them traveling on short funds, the Japanese alone seem most amply supplied with money.

Accordingly, a group of Japanese settlers, the vanguard of more to come, sailed from Japan a few days ago aboard the O. S. K. liner Hiei Maru for their land of promise in that tropical region.

The group include 120 persons, constituting 28 families. They will settle in Sarawak and engage in the cultivation of rice, according to Japanese method.

SENATOR AKI IN LIMELIGHT IN HONOLULU

2nd Generation Solon Attacks Move to Fire Teachers

HONOLULU, Jan. 28—Henry Aki, junior senator from Kauai of Japanese ancestry in the territorial legislature, burst into the limelight today by his bold opposition to the proposed attempt of the board of education to drop 370 public school teachers next September.

"The decision, if carried out, will have a damaging effect upon the territory's educational system," Senator Aki declared in a press interview. He continued:

"The hullabaloo about public school economy, in this present attempt to fire school teachers, is merely a smoke screen to cover up an evil design: There is a conspiracy on the part of the sugar plantations to cripple the educational system in the island so that the generation now growing up will go to work on the plantations."

Aki is now completing his second term in the senate, where he has sat since the 1925 session. His wife is a school teacher.

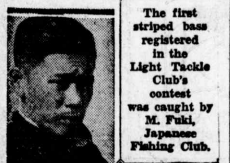
As a preliminary to the varsity game, the San Jose Y. W. B. A. six will play the Stockton girls. The tip off is set for 1:30.

NIPPON GUNBOATS OPEN FIRE ON FOES, FORTS AT SHANGHAI ARE SILENCED

Forty Rounds Fired on Woosung Stronghold After Marines Move to Take Over Native Section of Port

SHANGHAI, China, Jan. 28—The Japanese gunboat flotilla fired 40 shells into the Woosung forts, defense of Shanghai, it was announced officially, from the flagship Ataka today.

The flagship announced that after silencing the Chinese batteries the Japanese were preparing to land at Woosung.

The Japanese with 4000 marines and 23 warships at Shanghai, halted temporarily their plans for drastic action today when the Chinese accepted in full the Japanese demands for cessation of anti-Japanese activity. The Japanese announced that they would occupy the native section of Shanghai and withdraw their troops while the Chinese proved their intention to live up to their promises. Nevertheless, their troops and ships were in position and ready for action any untoward action might bring.

202 Japanese Will Vie For Honors at Olympic Games

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 28—Japan's challenge for honors in the 10th Olympiad will be hurled by a team of 202 athletes and officials who will come to Los Angeles for the games next summer.

Formal notice of Japan's entry was made to heads of the Los Angeles organizing committee today by Prof. Ken Nakazawa, Japan Olympic attache and a member of the U. S. C. faculty here.

The Japanese athletic team will have at least 142 competitors, including 16 women.
