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## S. F. CONSUL BARES ROOT OF CONFLICT

### Assault on Japanese Priest Stirs Row In Shanghai

For the past several months an extremely tense feeling has existed between the Chinese and Japanese peoples in Shanghai because of China's hostile interference with Japanese trade, conducted by the anti-Japanese organizations in forcibly carrying out the so-called boycott by such atrocious means as the illegal confiscation of Japanese goods and the imprisonment of Japanese merchants dealing in Japanese goods.

Under these circumstances, on Jan. 18, without provocation, five Japanese Buddhist priests were attacked and seriously injured on the streets of Shanghai by about 50 Chinese factory workers.

#### Priests Attacked

Later three of these victims were thrown out on a native farm and almost killed by a mob of some 300 Chinese. In addition to this the Chinese press in Shanghai printed an article which was insulting to the Emperor of Japan.

Despite repeated protests made by the Japanese government the Chinese authorities have made no effort to suppress these anti-Japanese agitators.

In order to settle these incidents the Japanese consul general demanded of the mayor of Shanghai the dissolution of the anti-Japanese organizations, which are the fundamental causes of the present trouble in conjunction with the demand of the punishment of the assailants and a formal apology of the editor of the Chinese press.

Cause Cited  
These demands were accepted by the mayor of Shanghai and the Japanese authorities waited for the Chinese to execute the accepted terms.

Meanwhile the municipal council of the International Settlement on Jan. 28 promulgated martial law in Shanghai and the foreign troops, including the Japanese, were assigned to their respective positions in the council's plan of general defense of the International Settlement.

Immediately after the Japanese marines took their position in a zone thus assigned the Chinese regulars disregarding their own government's order, fired upon the Japanese marines, and consequently the unfortunate clash between the two forces was started.

On Jan. 29, at 8 p. m. a truce was agreed upon by the commander of the Japanese marines and the mayor of Shanghai through the good offices of the British and American consul generals and both forces stopped their activities in accordance with the agreement.

Peace Sought  
On the morning of the 30th, however, the Chinese artillery, without any provocation, suddenly fired upon the Japanese marines, who were consequently obliged to retreat in order to avoid the aggravation of the situation.

The Japanese authorities therefore notified the British and American consul generals as well as the mayor of Shanghai that if the Chinese did not stop the firing the Japanese would resume the activities.

So far as we are now officially informed, the two consul generals are still endeavoring to bring both parties to conciliatory terms.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 5—A "mad genius" appeared at the Japanese consulate the other morning in a tuxedo, and putting the young vice-consul, Kakichi Ozawa, on the silent end of a conversation, declared that he has invented the greatest invention of all times—a magnetic contraption which can control the movements of warships, airplanes, torpedos, bombs, automobiles, and everything else.

The Los Angeles Japanese American, which carried the story, declares that this man who called himself Suzuki, a Hollywood butler, and dramatically said, "I want to serve my country and my Emperor. Please notify the Japanese foreign office about my great discovery that they might use it against the marauding Chinaman!"

"My invention eclipses anything invented by Thomas Edison. He was only my disciple. I can immediately ask Henry Ford to manufacture my invention," the visitor boasted and left.

## JAPAN QUOTA IS OPPOSED BY S. F. MAN

### McClatchy Airt Views On Immigration to Davis Rotary

DAVIS, Feb. 5 — Davis Rotary heard from V. S. McClatchy, speaking for the California Joint Immigration committee and its supporting bodies, American Legion, Federation of Labor and Native Sons of the Golden West, in reply to a previous address delivered before many Rotary clubs of the State in which immigration quota for Japan was urged on the plea that it would cultivate international goodwill and thus serve the sixth principle of International Rotary.

Quota Not Harmless  
The plea that the quota for Japan would be practically harmless, since only 185 Japanese per year would be admitted thereunder, he declared to be a half truth, more misleading than a false statement. Quota for Japanese involves necessarily quota for other Asiatic peoples who are ineligible for citizenship. Each would be entitled to a quota of 100 minimum, the aggregate being about 1000. More serious, however, would be the repeal of the exclusion law and the abandonment of its basic principle, which furnishes legitimate ground for exclusion of Filipinos and Mexican Indians.

National Origin  
Even limitation of Japanese quota to 185 is dependent, he explained, on maintenance of the existing restriction plan and the national origins system of allotment. A return to the foreign born 1890 basis, as recommended by President Hoover and demanded by Republican leaders at the previous congress, and now proposed in two bills before the present congress, would result in the admission of over 2000 Chinese per year.

He declared, too, that if the Japanese were made eligible for admission as immigrants Japan would in time demand the right to send as many immigrants as any other first class power. She claims now preferential treatment from the United States for her nationals in immigration and citizenship as against all other nations of Asia because of her status as a world power.

## CHINESE RUN AS JAPANESE TAKE HARBIN

HARBIN, Manchuria, Feb. 5 (U.P.)—The Japanese completed the occupation of Harbin today during a final bitter battle in which the Chinese troops were routed.  
Japanese troops moved into both the old and new cities of Harbin after a stiff battle lasting two hours.  
The 7000 Japanese residents of Harbin cheered the arrival of the forces from home. They had been living in terror while the expeditionary forces marched on the city, under General Hasabe.  
The Chinese troops and their commanding officers fled in complete rout. General Ting Chou, commanding, and other anti-Kirin leaders escaped to the north.  
GENEVA, Feb. 5 (U.P.)—The world arms conference convened in plenary session today and elected Tameo Matsudaira, of Japan, one of the vice presidents, smoothing over a delicate situation in which threats of Japanese withdrawal from the conference had been made unless Matsudaira were elected.  
In the election of vice presidents, 54 nations voted.

## SHANGHAI, Feb. 5 (U.P.)—The first army transport from Japan arrived this afternoon and began landing guns north of the settlement. The arrival marked the first invasion of regular Japanese troops to reinforce the marines hitherto carrying on the battle.

Japanese headquarters announced the bulk of the army forces could not arrive before Sunday from Japan.  
At 10 p m the heavy bombardment in Chapei quieted down with the positions of the opposing forces relatively unchanged. The Japanese relinquished some of their gains and returned to their defensive lines, apparently to await the arrival of the army reinforcements.

## Chinese Losses Heavier

The Chinese troops suffered tremendous losses. Japanese reports indicate the casualties among Chinese exceeded 1000.  
Ten Japanese airplanes loaded with high explosives flew low over Chapei. They opened up with machine guns over dwindling lines of Chinese, fighting desperately amid ruins of blackened buildings.

## Three Cage Tilts Set For Salvation Army Court Soon

Showa cagers are slated to tangle with the U. C. Bears in the main event at the Salvation Army court Saturday evening at 8 in an A league tilt with their babe five meeting the local Bussel squad for the curtain raiser.  
When the Showa cubs officials learned that the Merritts and Y had no floor to play their game, they offered the teams the use of the court for a 9 o'clock contest.  
The Showa babes will start their battle at 7. A charge of a dime will be made at the door to cover expenses for the court.
