(Special to Japanese American News) PEIPING, Feb. 16—Marshal Chang Hsueh Liang, once a patron of the Chinese night club which became a popular feature of Peiping life during the past year, has abruptly put an end to their existence.

The mayor appointed by Marshal Chang, undoubtedly with his approval, issued an order cancelling the licenses of 50 odd cabarets that have transformed Peiping's night life during 1931.

Thousands of students and junior officers are disappointed. They had gone to these places night after night, learning the western style of dances from Chinese girls who were imported from Shanghai and other places.

The girls were disappointed even more. This was their means of making a living. Some of them are now stranded, others have gone back to cities where cabarets are still permitted.

Nine Boats Leave Belfast Carrying Japan Munitions

The shipment was made up of whippet tanks, field guns, rifles, ammunition, gases, explosives and chemicals.

The convoy is avoiding the Suez canal and is going around the Cape. It is being met by Japanese warships at the entrance to the China sea.

It is said to be the biggest single shipment ever sent from Great Britain.
