SINO SHELLS KILL BRITISH IN SHANGHAI

Two British Naval Men are Slain By Shell Fire

By H. R. EKINS (United Press Staff Correspondent)

SHANGHAI, Feb. 17.—The heavy artillery fire echoed throughout the Settlement and endangered foreign residents, today. Houses on the settlement's northern border were struck.

The Settlement spent an anxious night as shell fire from both sides of the Chapel section where 20,000 Japanese and 35,000 Chinese troops awaited the big offensive was heard.

Two British seamen were killed today by Chinese shells which struck the Hongkew wharf within the settlement, a few hours after shells fell in an area occupied by U. S. marines.

Adm. Koshi Shiosawa and Vice Adm. Nomura, commanding Japanese naval forces here, said there were two alternatives—diplomatic negotiations or force.

Both insisted that they favored negotiations which would make possible peaceful withdrawal of Chinese forces.

Minister Mamoru Shigemitsu said progress had been made in conversations with Chinese officials involving mutual concessions and withdrawal of troops by both sides.

TOKYO, Feb. 17.—Japanese officials at Shanghai were authorized by their government today to hand the Chinese an ultimatum demanding that the Chinese 19th Route army withdraw 20 kilometers from the International Settlement.

Otherwise, Lieut. Gen. Uyeda, commander of the Japanese expeditionary forces, was authorized to compel the withdrawal by force.

TOKYO, Feb. 17.—Mischief mongers are spreading talk of a Japanese-American war using the Shanghai incident in an effort to impose their jingoism on a credulous world.

The extent to which the world gives attention to such foolish propaganda indicates the extent to which it is playing into the hands of sinister agents who are agitating for concealed, selfish ends.

Despite agitation, war does not come to a wise humanity. However, we must be on guard against the propaganda of third parties whose interests are served by Japanese-American agitation.

Uneasiness is Denied I have been asked if the Japanese navy is uneasy regarding American naval maneuvers in the Pacific. Quite the contrary, we do not feel the remotest concern. Nervousness, suspiciousness and hysteria are not characteristics of Japanese sailors.

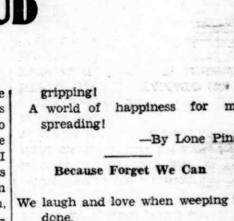

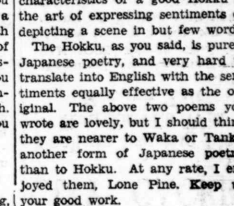
