


## ASIA WAR TO BE AIRED AT PEACE MEET

Wakasugi, Kwong will Address Parley in Berkeley Mar. 5

(Special to Japanese American News)  
BERKELEY, Feb. 25—Two notable addresses, presenting the two sides of the controversy in the present Sino-Japanese war in Shanghai, will be delivered on Saturday, March 5, before the California state convention of Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, convening in this city.

At 11:30 Consul General Wakasugi of Japan will speak on "How To Settle the Chinese-Japanese Conflict," at the Hotel Durant, convention headquarters.

At 3 p.m. in Unity hall, Dana and Bancroft, V. Kwong Lee, official representative of Y. S. Wong, Chinese consul general, will give "The Chinese Viewpoint of the Chinese-Japanese Conflict."

At 6:30 the convention banquet will be held at the International house.

Prof. George M. Stratton of the University of California will give the main address, "The League and the United States."

All sessions are open to the public.

## Ex-Emperor to Head Manchuria Republic

MUKDEN, Feb. 25—The northeastern executive committee of the new Manchurian state announced today it would be nominally a republic for the time being with Henry Pu-yi, former boy emperor of China, as provisional executive.

The constitution, following the Nanking model, provides for three councils, known as a legislative yuan, a national affairs yuan and an inspection yuan.

The outline of the constitution failed to mention how the people should participate in the government beyond providing that the chief executive should be nominated by and be responsible to the people.

The choice of Changchun to be the capital of the new republic brought gloom to Mukden business circles and corresponding joy to Changchun.
