## NAGAO SAYS HE'S SLAYER OF T. MORINO

Confession to Police  
Reveals Killing  
'By Mistake'

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 8—After lingering in the dark room for 72 hours or more, Sikihi Nagao, 33 year old salesman, Monday broke down to confess that he killed Thomas Morino, who was found dead in the warehouse leased by Teldo Iizumi, on the afternoon of Feb. 28.

Nagao said he killed Morino "by mistake" on the evening of December 8 about 8 o'clock. Authorities found a .38 calibre revolver bullet in Morino's brain, but Nagao has "forgotten" where the death pistol is. Police believe if the revolver can be found, they will have the link in the chain of evidence that they can force to send Nagao to the gallows.

Many Rumors

Rumors were rampant about the new Japanese community here that, behind this murder which took place over two months ago and resulted in the maiming of the victim to the walls of an empty warehouse closet and left there to decompose until discovered only a week ago, there might be a scandalous story which the victim had known and which had to be hushed up by the scandal fearing murderers.

Teldo Iizumi, grocery store owner and employer of Morino, and Nagao, salesmen, are now held by the police for suspicion of murder. Their arrest resulted after the discovery of a diary written by the murdered victim on a piece of scratch paper in simple Japanese revealing that some one of the person was "laying" for him and that these persons were sinking persons.

Another slant on this morbid tale is the story of several neighbors of the grocer who said that Nagao had a .38 calibre revolver which he had shown to them some time ago. This fact together with the discovery of a .38 calibre bullet in the brain of the victim brought the light of suspicion on Nagao.

Have Tips

Police were informed from the outside that on the evening of December 8, about 9 o'clock, during a heavy downpour of rain a truck bearing the label of "Laundry" was backed up to the door of Iizumi's warehouse.

Detectives acting on the tips traced the possession of the laundry truck to Nagao on the fatal night of December 8. It was probably this fact was used as a lever that brought about Nagao's confession.

Since his disclosures, Nagao looks happier and the feeling of relief that he shows leads authorities to doubt the theory of mistake. Efforts are being directed to recovering the death gun.

Love Triangle

Working on outside tips, authorities have uncovered a scandalous tale linking Mrs. Iizumi, the wife of the grocer, Teldo Iizumi, and the accused salesman, who has a comely 22 year old wife and a baby girl in a love triangle.

Authorities are working on the theory that Morino was the only one aware of this triangle and the meetings that took place between Nagao and Mrs. Iizumi. In order to hush the scandal that might follow Morino's story, police believe that Morino was killed.

Iizumi still reposes in the county jail where detectives desire to keep him.
